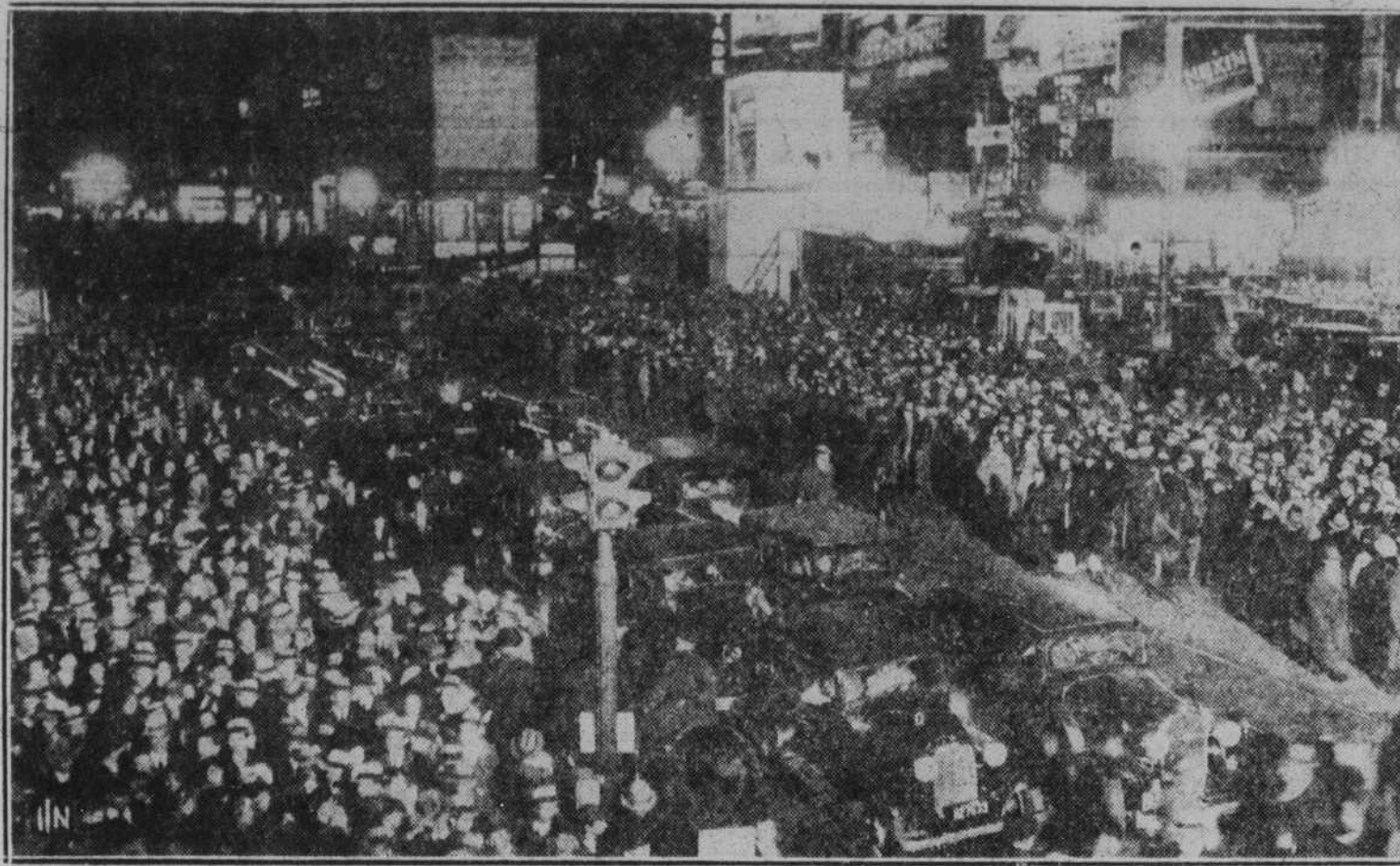

Fifth President From N. Y. State

Van Buren, Fillmore, Cleveland And Teddy Roosevelt Came From New York.

New York, Nov. 10.—Franklin D. Roosevelt will be the fifth man to go to the White House from New York state and the fourth governor of the United States.

Martin Van Buren was the first president from New York. He was inaugurated in 1837 after having first served as governor.

Millard Fillmore was inaugurated in 1850. He had been a congress man.

In 1885 Grover Cleveland went from the executive mansion at Albany to the White House and in 1901 Theodore Roosevelt, a former governor of New York, who had been elected vice-president, became president by the assassination of William McKinley.
