Mrs. Ed Hove and little daughter, Betty of Greensboro, are spending the week with her mother-in-law Mrs. C. W. Hove.

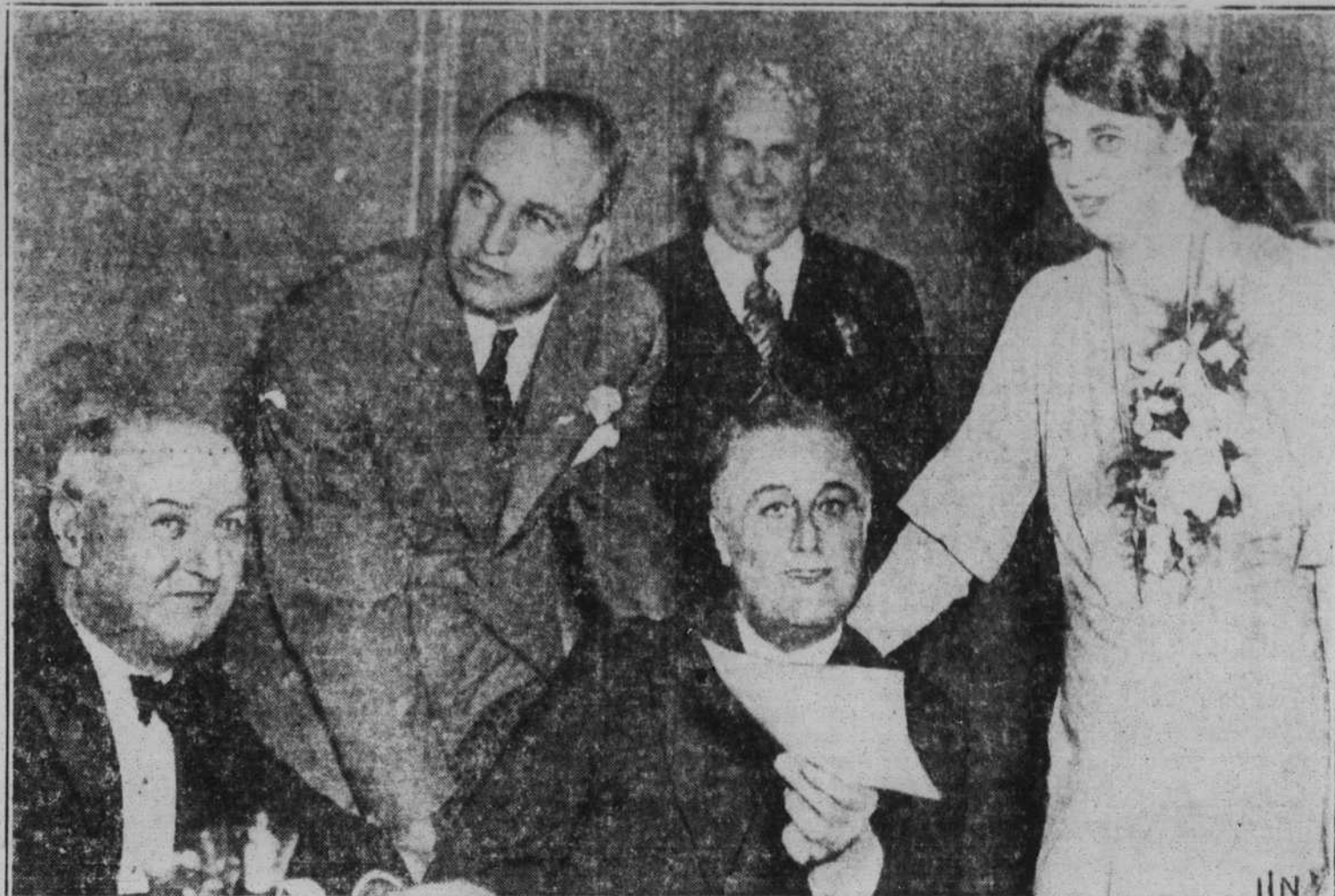

Mr. Boyles, Toluca Man, Has a Knack for Raising Beans at Toluca.

Toluca, Nov. 10.—Mr. F. A. Boyles seems to be the champion farmer this year of the community. He produces more wheat and oats and cotton per acre than most any other man. In the spring he grew 150 quarts of beans on one short row in his garden. Later in the summer he had a little more than one-half acre in beans from which he picked between 50 and 60 bushels, and then in the fall he had eight rows of 15 yards long, from which he picked 10 1-4 bushels. Most other farmers in the community could hardly raise enough beans to eat. He used the spray method for the beetle. He also won the \$5.00 turnip prize.
