Complete Diversion Of Colorado River

Boulder City, Nev., Nov. 15.—Diversion of the Colorado river was completed here today, with \$27,000,000 spent thus far on the \$165,000,000 Hoover dam project.
The full flow of the stream was sent through the two Arizona diversion tunnels after the completion of a rock fill barrier. It was accomplished in less than 24 hours after the Sunday noon blast of 150,000 pounds of dynamite that signaled the river was about to give up a portion of its bed and dive underground.
