"Happy Days Are Here Again" For Jailed Dry Law Violators

States Which Repudiated Liquor Laws at Polls Consider Amnesty for Prisoners Convicted Under Dry Code.

Now that the smoke has all cleared away and the ballots are all counted, nine States of the Union in which citizens balloted on the prohibition question, simultaneously with choosing a President, are faced with the problem of translating the will of the people into practice. The people of these States have repudiated the State liquor laws, and the authorities now find themselves with a large number of prisoners, occupying State penitentiaries for deeds which are no longer considered illegal. To straighten out the tangle Governor-elect William A. Comstock of Michigan has announced that just as soon as he takes office he will grant a general amnesty to the 297 prisoners held in State prisons for liquor offenses. Governor James Rolph, of California, intended to take a similar course, but a State law makes such blanket pardons illegal, so the Governor promises to grant individual pardons to more than 1,000 caged dry law violators before Christmas. In like manner, Governor-elect B. B. Moeur of Arizona plans freedom for the State's liquor "felons," asserting that such prisoners are in jail for something that the people have ruled is not a crime. New Jersey's Governor Harry Moore is also on the let-freedom-ring bandwagon, but as New Jersey has but one liquor prisoner, his task is easy. Washington and North Dakota have not yet decided a course of action, but it is fairly certain that they will come into line. But Colorado, where Governor William A. Adams holds the reins, turns in a stern "No!" to the amnesty suggestion, declaring that prisoners will be released only when they become eligible for parole. To sum up, it would appear that the old war-time slogan, "Get the boys out of the trenches before Christmas," has been changed to "Get 'em out of jail before Christmas."
