Italy Would Clean Its War Debt Slate

Rome, Dec. 7.—A resolution insisting on "a complete clean slate" of war debts and reparations was approved by the Fascist grand council Monday night.

The resolution suggested that the government pay \$1245,437 due the United States on Dec. 15 and then urge the conclusion of a new accord with the United States on war debts payments before June 15, 1933, when the next installment is due.

Reduce Salaries In N. Y. 20 Millions

New York, Dec. 6.—A reduction of \$20,000,000 in city salaries was ordered by the Tammany-controlled board of estimate. This was the first gesture of the economies demanded by banking groups before they would make loans for relief.

B. S. College Students Given Physical Exam

Girls Found to be Above Average in Physical Excellence by Local Doctors.

Boiling Springs, Dec. 6.—The young women of Boiling Springs college have recently been given a physical examination which included an examination of the eyes, ears, nose, throat, teeth, blood pressure, heart and lungs. Miss Kneese, the dean of women, had felt for some time that the physical welfare of the girls required such an examination but no definite step had been taken until recently. After consultation with both local and county physician it was decided to hold the examination on December 2.

Those assisting were Dr. D. F. Moore, county physician, Dr. Tom Gold, ear, eye, nose and throat specialist, Dr. A. Pitt Beam, dental member of the county board of health and Dr. J. Z. Hamrick, local practitioner.

The record made by each physician shows that the girls are above the average in physical excellence. Owing to the ideal climatic conditions in this section of the state, the students of Boiling Springs have always had excellent health during the school year. However, provision has been made for young women who may be confined to their rooms on account of illness. The class of '32 donated to the college the money with which to begin an infirmary. Two rooms in a wing of the girls' dormitory were selected for this purpose. Necessary articles for the infirmary are being contributed by friends of the school.

For these gifts and for the cooperation efforts of those assisting in the physical examinations the college is deeply grateful.
