

Tribune Publisher Attacks Securities

New York, Dec. 6.—Several cities in North Carolina were placed in the same economic boat with Chicago by Colonel Robert R. McCormick publisher of the Chicago Tribune, at the initial session of the national conference of law and business held at New York university. He declared that securities of Asheville, Durham, Greensboro, High Point and Winston-Salem, along with those of Chicago, New York, Detroit and other cities, do not measure up to their respective investment standards. McCormick added that "federal appropriations exceed revenues by two billion dollars."

Germany's Soldier-Chancellor Has Long Ruled From Behind

General Kurt von Schleicher Dictated Policies of Last Two Ministries. Also Controls Police and Entire Army.



Although the appointment of General Kurt von Schleicher as Chancellor of Germany by President Paul von Hindenburg is hailed by the press and public as a change, it is well known that the only real change is the emergence of von Schleicher from behind the scenes to accept responsibility for the policies which he has dictated to the last two ministries. For years the nominal rulers of the country have known that the real power lay with the man who sat behind the desk in the Reichwehr Ministry, and any time during the last decade von Schleicher could have been Chancellor, but he didn't want the job. On one occasion he is said to have remarked, "If I were Chancellor I would need only one assistant—a hangman." As it is now, he is confining himself to two assistants. They are Franz Bracht, Commissioner of Prussia and Minister of the Interior, and Dr. Guenther Gereke, Minister of Labor. Von Schleicher is retaining the post of Minister of Defense, which places him in the almost invulnerable position of being in control of the army and police, as well as the political machinery of the country. It is predicted that von Schleicher will wage a ruthless war on Adolf Hitler, Fascist firebrand, despite their friendship, if the Blackshirt chief persists in attacking the government, but it is believed that Hitler will come into line and co-operate with the new regime. Von Schleicher has an ambitious program planned for relief of unemployment and the restoration of prosperity. This program has won him the support of the press and resulted in the first favorable reaction in many months on the Berlin stock exchange.

Complains Of Poor Packing Of Cotton Baled For Export

China Says Unless Southern Cotton Is Packed Better, Sale Will Slump.

Poor baling of American cotton is of course, an old story well known to every cotton exporter. The subject, however, has arisen again in the China market, as is evidenced by a cablegram received from commercial Attache Juleau Arnold, Shanghai, by the Charlotte district office of the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce. Mr. Arnold cables: "American cotton exporters shipping standard size American bales of cotton in China should be cautioned against bales arriving with cotton badly exposed which is adding seriously to fire risks and making losses to importers. During the past fourteen weeks Shanghai experienced three serious fires in American cotton cargoes and losses were said to be greatly enhanced because of bad packing. Out of any lot of 100 American bales selected at random the majority have broken bands and badly torn covering leaving loosened contents exposed and frazzled. Future American cotton business believed jeopardized by careless packing."
