Motherhood First-Then Death Awaits Convicted Woman Slayer

Nation's Eyes on South Carolina, Where Expectant Mother May Go to Electric Chair After Birth of Her Babe.



Ic retribution for the act of one frenzied moment, during which she pumped four bullets into the body of Constable Elliot Harris, who was scuffling with her husband, Mrs. Beatrice Snipes is in the State Peniten-tiary at Columbia, S. C., awaiting execution, scheduled for April 7. The remote date was fixed because the young wife, already a mother, will beat another child soon. In view of the peculiar circumstances of the case, a movement is steadily growing all over the country with the object of securing a commutation of sentence for the condemned woman, whom the inexorable machinery of the law has condemned to suffer the pains of death almost immediately after those of motherhood. However, the protests against the severity of the sentence are not actuated by senti-ment alone. Many legalists hold the opinion that the woman was wrong-fully sentenced. Inasmuch as the State failed to show premeditation, they say, the verdict ought to have been one of manulaughter. The facts are these: Mrs. Snipes, with her husband, Clyde Snipes, and two friends were stopped and searched for liquor while driving in their auto. No liquor was found, but the officer, Constable Elliot Harris, attempted to arrest Clyde for reckless driving. A scuffle ensued, during which Mrs. Snipes went to aid her mate. She was struck on the mouth, and, mad-dened with pain and excitement, she grabbed the officer's gun and fired four shots, killing him. Physicians contend that Mrs. Snipes, taking her condition into account, was not responsible for her actions at that time But the law says she must die. Humanity says "NO!"






