My Favorite Recipes

If there is anything a woman really enjoys making more than little cakes for parties, I don't happen to know about it. A little fancy work is relished now and then by all of us, no matter how practical—a chance to feel something like an artist as well as a cook.

Coconut Jelly Balls

3/4 cup sifted cake flour; 1/2 teaspoon combination baking powder; 1/4 teaspoon salt; 1 tablespoon butter or other shortening; 1/2 cup sugar; 1 egg, unbeaten; 1 can moist, sweetened coconut; 1/2 cup milk; 1/2 teaspoon vanilla; 1/2 cup tart jelly.

Coconut Drop Cookies

3/4 cup sifted cake flour; 1 teaspoon combination baking powder; 1/8 teaspoon salt; 2 tablespoons butter or other shortening; 4 tablespoons sugar; 1 egg, well beaten; 1 tablespoon milk; 1 cup shredded coconut.

Chocolate Coconut Squares

1 cup sifted cake flour; 1/2 teaspoon soda; 1/8 teaspoon salt; 4 tablespoons butter or other shortening; 1/2 cup sugar; 1 egg, well beaten; 1 square unsweetened chocolate, melted; 2 tablespoons milk; 1/2 can moist, sweetened coconut.

Governor Believes Much Economy Can Be Had In Governing Costs Of All Counties, Cities And Towns

Raleigh, Jan. 9.—While Governor J. C. B. Ehringhaus is interested in bringing about additional economy and decreased spending in every branch of government, both state and local, he believes that there is probably a greater opportunity for economy in the governments of counties, cities and towns at the present time than in the state government. As a result he is inclined to believe that all the recommendations he made in his inaugural address, those pertaining to greater economy in the administration of local governments are among the most important he made. He is fully aware, however, of the difficulties incident to the carrying out of these recommendations and that much time will be required to see them fulfilled.

Will Take Time
"With regard to my recommendations suggesting the machinery for voluntary consolidation of counties and of cities and counties, I fully realize that it will take considerable time to bring these things about and that it would not be wise for the state to attempt to compel any of these consolidations," Governor Ehringhaus said. "Yet I believe that if a general law is passed giving blanket permission to any counties to consolidate without the necessity of getting a special law passed by the general assembly, that eventually some consolidations will come about. I agree that a state-wide educational campaign will be required to get the people in the various counties to see the wisdom of consolidation. But I intend to start such a campaign and with the help of the newspapers of the state, I am confident that eventually public sentiment will take charge and bring about these consolidations."

Power To Reduce Salaries
Another step which Governor Ehringhaus believes will bring about much economy in the counties, cities and towns and do it immediately, is the enactment of a state-wide law giving boards of county commissioners and city and town councils power to reduce any and all salaries and to abolish any offices or jobs, regardless of whether such salaries or offices have been created by legislative enactment. It is a well known fact here that many local officials whose salaries or offices have been fixed or created by legislative enactments have refused to take salary cuts on the grounds that the general assembly fixed their salaries by law and that only the general assembly could reduce the salaries or abolish the jobs. This general law advocated by Governor Ehringhaus and which will be introduced during this session with his hearty support, will put all these office holders and their jobs on the same basis as all others and give the local governing boards the power to either reduce the salaries or abolish the jobs entirely.

Power To Eliminate
"The salaries of local officials fixed by the general assembly should be construed only as representing the maximum limits of these salaries and the local governing boards should have full authority to reduce salaries to whatever levels they think adequate in the light of present conditions," Governor Ehringhaus said. "They should also have the power to eliminate any offices not necessary to the operation of their local government." Governor Ehringhaus made it plain that he is in favor of making additional economies in the operation of the state government as well as in the operation of the county, city and town governments and that every effort will continue to be made to further reduce the expenses of state government. But he pointed out that the state has been reducing its expenses steadily for the past three years and in many respects has gone much farther than have the governmental subdivisions. He pointed out that the state has already reduced salaries of state employes more than \$2,500,000 within the past two years and that the present general assembly seems inclined to reduce salaries and other governmental expenses still more.

"It still seems to me, however, that the individual taxpayer will get more benefit from economies made in the operation of local governments than from any other source and that there is really more opportunity for reducing expenditures in the local governments than anywhere else," Governor Ehringhaus said.
