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Probing New Plot Against Lindberghs
Roanoke, Va., Feb. 15.—Federal agents here and in Washington today delved further into ramifications of a plot to extort \$50,000 from Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh by threats to harm his second son. Exactly what direction the investigation now is taking was not revealed as preparations went forward for a hearing scheduled for Saturday afternoon when three young defendants will be brought before a United States commissioner to face charges of conspiracy and sending threatening letters through the mail. It was known, however, that close scrutiny was being given to the extortion notes, sent to Colonel Lindbergh and deposited in a hollow stump "post office" here for a police agent who posed as Lindbergh's representative and that these are being compared with samples of the handwriting of the defendants and with the notes left by the kidnapers who less than a year ago kidnaped the flier's first son. Other federal activities were unrevealed except for a hint that persons not now under arrest are being sought for questioning in connection with the case.

Coach Paul Hutchins' speedy Boiling Springs college cage team won another game last night, defeating Rutherford college at Boiling Springs by the score of 51-36.
