Some Farmers To Fight Cotton Plan Gastonia.—A hurried partial canvass of cotton growing sections of Gaston county revealed that while a considerable number of local growers are disposed to approve the recently announced government plan of cotton crop curtailment, the growers of the county as a whole are by no means solidly behind the plan. It all revolves, according to County Agent L. B. Altman, into the fact that farmers who have a good stand of cotton are not willing to plow any part of it under for the bonus offered in the government plan, while farmers whose cotton is doing badly are ready to join in without further delay.
