To maintain the same wage scale and shorter hours for regular employees and at the same time add to the plant's operating cost, means quite a sacrifice. Especially does it mean a sacrifice in the face of losses that have been incurred during the past two years in operating The Star plant, but we feel confident that a general recovery will justify the sacrifice we are making within the next 30 or 60 days.
