Inquest Unnecessary, Says Physician Following An Examination Of Body.

Forest City, Sept. 17. — Forrest Butler, 35, was found dead at his home here about 12:30 o'clock this morning. The discovery was made by a neighbor. Butler, whose wife is in a hospital at Morganton and whose two children stay with their grandparents, had been "batching" with another man who was away near the home of his father. He had been dead about three hours when discovered.

Shelby Death Not Blamed On Vaccine

The news reports tell of the death of a negro woman in Cleveland county whose passing is attributed to excess consumption of a particular brand of strong drink, coupled with the fact that she had recently been vaccinated against typhoid fever. Without knowing anything about it, it is questioned that the typhoid vaccine had anything to do with the woman's death. But of course that had to be mentioned as a possible contribution. There is yet, in this day of enlightenment, considerable superstition about vaccine. When smallpox epidemics were common in North Carolina a generation ago numerous people refused vaccination, pretending to believe that the prevention was

more dangerous than the disease. Numerous stories were circulated without basis in fact, about loss of arms and deaths from smallpox vaccine. These treatments have become so common and of such recognized benefits that one rarely hears of objection to them now. But it may be expected that some who read of the negro woman's death from liquor consumption following the administration of typhoid vaccine will shy off from that treatment until the incident is forgotten.
