### In Legal Ring

New York, Dec. 1.—Under the caption "The Carolina Plan" the New York American published an editorial lauding North Carolina's system of public education. "North Carolina, the only state in the union which guarantees an eight months' school term for every child in its borders, may be the outstanding bright spot in an otherwise dark year for public education in the United States," says the editorial.

"The reason North Carolina is able to provide eight months' schooling for every child in the state in a year when thousands of children in other states are denied any schooling, or are reduced to part-time schooling," says the paper, "is because North Carolina reorganized its system of government several years ago."

The newspaper praises leadership of Governors Gardner and Ehringhaus, including "The people of North Carolina believe that they will be better served by giving to every child in the state eight months of good schooling than by giving to every local politician a place upon the public payroll."

Eighty-two Farmers Sign Acreage Reduction Contracts. Will Receive \$3,200.  
(Lincoln County News.)  
Eighty-two wheat farmers in Lincoln county who have signed wheat acreage reduction contracts with the federal government, are expected to receive their checks from the government within the next few weeks for the amount of wheat which they contracted to take out of production next year, according to a statement made by County Agent Graham Morrison this week, who has charge of the campaign in Lincoln to reduce wheat acreage next year.

Mr. Morrison stated that several counties in the state had already received their checks but that the large number of contracts signed made it impossible for all counties to receive checks at the same time. Lincoln farmers will receive in the neighborhood of \$3,200 or fifty-four percent of the estimated crop of 30,000 bushels.

Payments to farmers are based on a three year program to be carried out.

Denver, Dec. 1.—Just as the gold in Colorado's mountains is enhanced by the national administration's economic program, boosting its price to new high levels, so is the glided dome of the state's capitol to shine forth with renewed splendor. As evidence of the state's co-operation in another phase of the program, one thousand dollars worth of gold paint has been ordered by the state.

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### N. Y. Newspaper Lauds Carolina School Progress

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Washington, Dec. 1.—The leaf tobacco dealers of Tennessee and Kentucky, re-dryers, packers and stores, have submitted a code to the AAA. Forty weeks, and a wage scale of \$12 to \$16 weekly, based on population of the cities where the labor is performed, is proposed in the code, which was prepared under the direction of J. I. Miller, of Wilson, president of the national association.
