Bailey Favors PWA, CWA Investigation

Senator Thinks Piffless Publicity On Frauds Would Have Good Effect.

Washington, Feb. 6.—Growing in part out of the known attitude of the President, and in part out of the investigations by the senate on matters pertaining to air mail contracts—a probe being taken so seriously that three air line officials were today cited for contempt for failure to answer questions of the Black committee—there will probably be an investigation of the facts surrounding the granting of loans by the public works and CWA. The chief objective of this inquiry would be to ascertain what payments have been made to lawyers and agents by those seeking grants and loans.

Senator Bailey thinks such an inquiry, accompanied by the piffless publicity that would naturally follow, would have a good effect. The administration is also seeking to discourage the practice of members of congress, in assisting people to secure money from the government for private projects. Some members, however, have done no more than give letters of introduction to constituents who desire to secure loans from governmental agencies.

John W. Mullens Dies At Lincolnton

Lincolnton, Feb. 5.—John W. Mullens, retired farmer of the Vase section of Lincoln county, died this afternoon. Death was due to paralysis with which he was stricken several months ago. He was 83 years of age.

Huey Will Face \$500,000 Libel Suit

King Charged With Slander Of Ansell, Turner Counsel In Senate Committee.

Washington, Feb. 5.—The District of Columbia court of appeals yesterday ruled that Senator Long, Democrat, Louisiana, must defend a \$500,000 civil action for libel brought by Samuel T. Ansell, former counsel for the senate committee which investigated the election of Senator Overman, Democrat, Louisiana.

The court of appeals ruled that the constitutional protection "against arrest" of members of congress does not cover service of process in civil suits which does not involve actual detention of the person.

Another suit charged Long with slandering Ansell in a speech on the senate floor. The libel action charged that Long circulated copies of the Congressional Record containing the speech.

When the suits were filed Long moved to quash service of civil summons on the ground of immunity from prosecution while at Washington.
