Kinston, Mar. 6.—A college graduate who did not know which side Robert E. Lee was on in the Civil war has been found here. He was discovered by a newspaperman. The newspaperman reported the youth was born and reared in the South and graduated with honors from a North Carolina university. He "thought Lee was a Southerner but was not certain."

Slavs Have Taste For N. C. Potatoes

North Carolina sweet potatoes will shortly become a feature in the diet of Yugo-Slav farmers if the plans of Dr. Petar N. Martinovitch, of Geograd, mature.

In a letter to Prof. M. E. Gardner, head of the State college department of horticulture, Dr. Petar Martinovitch said he has been charged by the institute for which he is working to obtain some sweet potato seed from North Carolina. Previously, the ministry of agriculture attempted to use seed sweets from Algeria but these proved unsatisfactory.

Dr. Martinovitch turned to North Carolina. Complying with the request, Professor Gardner shipped seed of five varieties and has written Dr. Martinovitch just how to handle the potatoes for best results. Should the crop gain a foothold in Yugo-Slavia, Professor Gardner believes that a market for future seed stock may be developed.

Professor Gardner also reported considerable interest being developed in the production of seed Irish potatoes in the mountain sections of North Carolina. He looks forward to the time when certified seed produced by mountain growers will vie in popularity with seed from Maine and other sections. Eastern North Carolina farmers who grow Irish potatoes as an early commercial truck crop have been testing the mountain seed for the past few years and have gotten yields which compare favorably with the yields secured from seed grown in Maine and Canada.

While Seeking Chicken Thieves, Officers Uncover Unknown Crime

By Chance, Catawba Officers Arrest Law Breakers While Trailing Another Crime.

How one man's complaint to county officers led to the discovery of another crime, leaving the former crime unsolved and landing the perpetrators of the latter in the clutches of the law, was revealed here Friday afternoon by Deputy Sheriff Ray Pitts.

F. R. Propst came into town Friday and reported to county officers that sometime during Thursday night somebody had stolen between 15 and 20 chickens from his chicken yard. Officers started an investigation and went to all grocery stores to notify the operators of the theft and to report if any one tried to sell them chickens.

While officers were at the P. E. Yount grocery store, three young boys walked into the store with seven chickens for sale. Something was said about stolen chickens, and the three boys, one still with an old hen under his arm, took to their heels. The officers gave chase and caught two of the boys, while the one with the hen made good his escape.

At first the two boys gave fictitious names, but when their true identity was revealed, they confessed that they had stolen seven chickens from Mrs. Ethel Fulbright, whom officers visited. Mrs. Fulbright, unaware of the theft of her fowls, made a check-up for the officers and discovered that seven of her 12 chickens had been stolen. The boys were charged with the theft and one was jailed and the other released under bond, pending a hearing as soon as possible.

Mr. Propst, the original complainant, and officers were Friday night still searching for the person or persons who relieved Mr. Propst of his fowls.

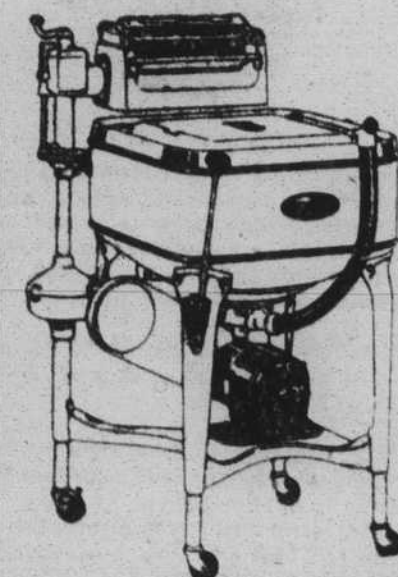
