

Gasoline Tax Rates You'll Pay This Year

Washington, D. C.—The federal gasoline tax of one-half cents per gallon expired January 1, 1934, but the federal tax of one cent remains, and there are six different state tax rates to pay when you travel this year.

Here's a table showing gasoline tax rates in each state. Add one cent for the federal tax. In Alabama, Louisiana, Missouri, Mississippi, New Mexico, and Florida look out for additional city or county taxes, or both.

Tax rates are given in cents per gallon:

- 2c—Connecticut, District of Columbia, Missouri, Rhode Island.
- 3c—California, Delaware, Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, New Jersey, New York, North Dakota, Pennsylvania.
- 4c—Indiana, Maine, Maryland, Nebraska, Nevada, New Hampshire, Ohio, Oklahoma, South Dakota, Texas, Utah, Vermont, West Virginia, Wisconsin, Wyoming.
- 5c—Arizona, Colorado, Idaho, Kentucky, Louisiana, Montana, Oregon, New Mexico, Virginia, Washington.
- 6c—Alabama, Georgia, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina.
- 6½—Arkansas.
- 7c—Florida, Tennessee.

Textile Executives Ask Code Change Oppose 6-Hr. Day,

Sloan Joins Manufacturers And Labor Representatives In Opposing Plan.

Washington, April 5.—George A. Sloan, president of the Cotton Textile Institute and chairman of the cotton code authority joined cotton textile manufacturers and labor representatives this week in opposing the petition of Johnson & Johnson, surgical dressing manufacturers, that the limitation of machinery hours under the code be modified to permit 24-hour operation.

Russell E. Watson, vice president of Johnson & Johnson, presenting the petition of two subsidiary companies, the Chicopee Manufacturing Corporation of Georgia and the Chicopee manufacturing company of Massachusetts, requested the cotton code be modified to permit any manufacturer to operate productive machinery on four six-hour shifts daily, provided the wage paid for six hours be the same that would be paid under the code for eight hours.

He said the modification would approximately double employment, that Johnson & Johnson would be assured an adequate supply of gauze of satisfactory quality, and the increased cost of four cents a pound and the increased profit margin of 2.1 cents a pound caused by the limitation of machinery to two eight hours shifts would be eliminated.

Sloan and other opponents said the proposal was directly opposed to the express policies of the national industrial recovery act.

The code authority president said since the war the essential weakness in the cotton textile industry has been its tremendous over-capacity and that if continuous operation were permitted, half the available spindles would supply the demand.
