Ask Air Pacts
Legislation to restore cancelled air mail contracts pending settlement of Postmaster General Farley's charges of fraud and collusion will be proposed today by three Republican Senators — Austin, Davis and Barbour. This bill is offered as a substitute for the Administration's permanent air mail measure.

Securities Issued

The largest issue of securities yet filed under the "truth in securities act" was announced yesterday by the trade commission in Washington. This commission reported a group of registration totaling \$70,000,000, the largest group hitherto announced, and including an issue of \$48,000,000, the largest single issue ever filed.

Cotton Experiment Station To Open At Statesville

Project Is Sponsored By U. S. Dept.

Carolina Has Money To Buy 131 Acres, Build Laboratory And Greenhouses.

College Station, Raleigh, April 9.—Two projects to develop better cotton and improve work in erosion control are being launched at the State test farm near Statesville, Dr. R. Y. Winters, director of the experiment station at State College, announced today.

Experiments are to be conducted in breeding cotton with a high yield and a strong resistance to disease, cold, drought, and other adverse conditions. The establishment of this project, Winters said, should greatly strengthen the cotton improvement program.

The branch station, known as the Piedmont test farm, will become one of the outstanding stations in the southeastern United States when the two projects are functioning, Winters stated.
