The men used hacksaws to sever the bars. They escaped shortly before 5 a. m. All were awaiting trial at the next term of superior court. Officers said the three white men, who were in a cell on the jail's second floor, cut four bars from their cell door, apparently came downstairs where they released the negroes, cut the grating protecting an outside window and fled.
