Move To Kill All Diseased Cattle

SALISBURY, May 8.—A resolution favoring the slaughter of all cattle affected with tuberculosis and Bang's disease as a means of controlling production of milk products rather than through a processing tax, was adopted at a joint meeting of the executive committees of the state granges of North Carolina and South Carolina in Columbia, S. C., Friday. It is announced here by W. G. Yeager, Rowan county farm agent and a member of the North Carolina committee.

A federal appropriation is recommended for payment for the cattle. The resolution is being wired to Henry Wallace, secretary of agriculture, to representatives in the house and senate, and to the chief of the dairy division in Washington.
