Three Students Make 8877 Pounds Of Lint Cotton On 12 1/2 Acres

Ellenboro Students In Agriculture, Make Records Of Cotton Produced Per Acre.

ELLENBORO, May 10.—With a record of three vocational agricultural students of the Ellenboro school, Roy Jones, Myles Jones and R. P. Blanton producing a total of 8877 pounds of lint cotton on twelve and one-half acres last year they were recently awarded first, second and third prizes in the state vocational cotton growing contest to stimulate less acres in cotton but more cotton per acre and greater profits. The awards were announced at the Better Farming banquet held about a month ago in the chamber of commerce building at Charlotte.

Following him comes Myles Jones with a record of 3739 pounds of lint from five acres to give him second place with the boys in the state and 400 pounds of nitrate of soda. He is the son of C. F. Jones of near Ellenboro.

R. P. Blanton who lives at Mooresboro but attends the meetings for farmers at Ellenboro produced 3600 pounds of lint on five and one-half acres which gave him third state prize with the evening students and 1,000 pounds of free nitrate of soda to him.

These contests have always stimulated less acres in cotton but more profit per acre due to high yields and low costs per pound of lint.

Tuberculosis Kills More Women Than Men In State

Sanatorium, May 7.—Notwithstanding a contrary opinion expressed some time ago regarding the country as a whole by Dr. E. V. Allen of the Mayo clinic, Rochester, Minnesota, the average man in North Carolina is considerably less likely to fall victim to tuberculosis than the average woman, according to an editorial in the May issue of 'The Sanatorium Sun,' official organ of the extension department of the North Carolina Sanatorium.

"However, well substantiated may be his (Allen's) claims to female superiority in ability to resist other diseases, the Sun is moved to challenge his statement in so far as it applies to tuberculosis among the people of North Carolina," the editorial says. "Fortunately, official statistics are available for service as soldiers in this battle to confirm the truth of a commonly accepted tradition."

"The most recent annual report of the Bureau of Vital Statistics of the North Carolina State Board of Health shows that during the 12 months mentioned 428 white males and 455 white females died of tuberculosis of the respiratory system. During the same period five male and six female Indians died of this disease. In the case of colored people, the deaths from pulmonary tuberculosis totaled 558 males and 644 females. A sum in simple arithmetic thus shows that 144 more female than male members of the three races taken as a whole died as victims of pulmonary tuberculosis."
