Only 3 Incumbents Seek Re-Election To State Senate

Records Show Only Eiford, Blackstock And Patton Ask To Return.

RALEIGH, May 17.—Only three Democratic incumbents of 19 who sat in the last state senate from districts in the western half of the state are seeking renomination in the June primary, records here indicate.

The western districts, eighteenth through thirty-third, have 21 senate seats but two were filled in 1933 by Republicans. No information was available today as to whether the G. O. P. members, J. M. Blackburn of Wilkes and George L. Greene of Mitchell, are seeking to succeed themselves.

Only Three Entered
From data available here the only men seeking to return to the upper house of the general assembly who sat in it in 1933 are C. C. Eiford of Stanly, C. E. Blackstock of Buncombe and R. A. Patton of Macon.

Among the "missing" will be L. M. Blue of Scotland, W. O. Burghill of Davidson, W. K. Boggan of Union, L. T. Hartsell, Jr., of Cabarrus, T. L. Kirkpatrick of Mecklenburg, Hayden Clement of Rowan, R. M. Hanes of Forsyth, S. G. Sparger of Stokes, J. W. Aiken of Catawba, E. M. Land of Iredell, R. G. Rankin of Gaston, S. P. Dunagan of Rutherford, J. O. Bell of Henderson, E. M. Hairfield of Burke, P. T. McNeill of Ashe and W. Roy Francis of Haywood.

Senator Blackstock is facing A. Hall Johnston, Asheville attorney, in his race in the thirty-first district, and Senator Eiford finds Erskine Smith, a former senator, and J. L. Whitely battling him. Whether or not Patton is opposed is not known here.

Young Humphries Joins The Marines

John Cleero Humphries Of Cleveland County Is Assigned To Parris Island.

SAVANNAH, Ga., May 17.—John Cleero Humphries, was among the limited number of young men who successfully passed the entrance examination for enlistment in the United States Marine Corps on May 14, 1934, according to an announcement received from Lieutenant Colonel A. B. Drum, Commanding Marine Recruiting Station, Savannah, Georgia.

Humphries was transferred to the Marine Base at Parris Island, S. C., for preliminary training. Upon completion of his training he will be either assigned to duty aboard a battleship, cruiser, or one of the many shore stations where marines serve. Mr. Humphries is a graduate of the Lattimore high school class of 1934, and prior to his entrance into the Marine Corps made his home with his parents Mr. and Mrs. William W. Humphries of Route No. 4, Shelby, N. C.

The Savannah office will have a limited number of vacancies for high school graduates during the next several months.

State Has Funds For Phone Probe

Utilities Commission To Retain Engineer In Investigation Of Telephone Rates.

RALEIGH, May 17.—With the assurance of Governor Ehringhaus that funds would be made available, the State Utilities commission has made arrangement to obtain the services of a utilities engineer immediately to assist it in its telephone rate investigation.

Commissioner Stanley Winborne and Associate Commissioner Fred L. Seely and Frank W. Hanft conferred with the governor following an all-day study of the utilities situation, and told him the services of an expert were essential before and during the first telephone exchange rate here on June 5.

The 1933 legislature made available \$10,000 for rate investigations, and provided that an additional \$35,000 a year might be used with the authority and council of state. To date only a small portion of the \$10,000 fund has been used in preparation of data on telephone, electric power and gas companies now available. No amount was fixed—that being open until plans are completed for the general investigation.

Memorial Poppies Recall War Scenes, Veterans Declare

Flowers On Battlefield Left Unforgettable Impression, Says R. D. Crowder, Post Commander.

The memorial poppies which the women of the American Legion auxiliary will distribute here on "Poppy Day," Saturday, May 26, will recall vivid pictures to the minds of World War veterans who served overseas, according to R. D. Crowder, Post Commander of Warren F. Hoyle Post of the American Legion. The poppies blooming amid the waste and destruction of the battle front, and among the bare graves of the dead, left an unforgettable impression on the American soldiers, he said.

"When the American divisions drove forward in the great offensives of 1918, they entered a region torn, desolated and trampled by the most tremendous battles of history. Destruction and death were everywhere but amid it all the little wild poppies bloomed on. When machine gun and shell fire took its toll from the American ranks, the poppy was nature's floral offering on the graves of the dead. To us those poppies seemed to symbolize the brave spirit of our fallen comrades and when we returned home we made the poppy the memorial flower of the American Legion."

Poppies to be worn in tribute to the men who gave their lives for America in the World War will be offered on the streets throughout the city Saturday, May 26th, by the American Legion Auxiliary women. Men of the Legion are cooperating in promotion of the project. The poppies, paper replicas of the flowers that grew on the battle fields, have been made by disabled veterans at Oteen, N. C. All contributions received for the poppies will be devoted to the rehabilitation and welfare work of the Legion and Auxiliary among the disabled veterans and the dependent families of veterans.
