### 59 Are Killed In N. C. Wrecks

RALEIGH, May 22.—Automobile wrecks claimed 59 lives in North Carolina during April, bringing to 287 the total for the year to May 1, the motor vehicle bureau reported today.

There were 319 accidents during April in which 460 persons were injured in addition to the 59 killed.

The toll for March was 78 killed and 358 injured.

Drunken drivers figured in eight of the fatal accidents last month and in 44 wrecks in which persons were injured. Hit-and-run drivers killed four and injured 17; speeders killed 10 and injured 35, and reckless drivers killed eight and injured 68.

Sixteen pedestrians, seven of whom were children playing in the street, were killed in April and 50 were injured. Four drunken persons walking on the highways were killed.
