The report was circulated Tuesday afternoon that R. C. Gold of Kings Mountain, would be eligible under the laws of North Carolina to demand a second primary for a place on the board of county com-

However, Chairman of the Board of Elections John P. Mull, and County Attorney Peyton McSwain, both examined closely the law respective to this point, and agree that under the conditions, Mr. Gold will not be eligible to demand the second primary.
