He had suffered a slight wound on the hand from a rusty nail, while working at the Weaver bridge between Shelby and


In their tentative estimate, set forth in easily understandable form by County Auditor Troy V. McKinney, the commissioners set up the sum of \$176,655.34, just \$6,784.60 more than last year. This difference is found in increased appropriations for a contingent fund, in a larger sum for maintenance of school buildings, and in slight increase for office expenses in all de-300 Bushels Beans crease for office expenses in all de-partments. In no instances have alaries been raised.

For The General Fund

The total amount set up for the eneral fund is \$46,365, which includes all salaries, administrative expenses, tax collection costs and election expenses.
