# Struck By Auto,

Leg Is Broken In

is Hit By Robert Andrew's Car As He Measures Gasoline: To Hold Funeral On Tuesday.

Ransom A. McEntire, a partner in the operation of the Champion Oil Co. of Shelby and member of a prominent Cleveland family, died in the hospital last night, never regaining full consciousness after being struck an hour before in front of his independent filling station on West Warren street by a car operated by Robert Andrews.

Mr. McEntire had just finished filling with wasoline a wrecker onerated by Charles Upton when Andrews' car struck him. It was raining at the time of the accident. Witesses to the accident were uncertain whether he had stepped away from the wrecker when he was hit or not, but saw him attempt to leap for safety when Andrew's car bore down on him. Andrews was driving his private car and had his family with him.

Rushed To Hospital

His left leg was broken and he suffered great loss of blood, even in the short time it required to rush him to the hospital. There, physiclans consulted on the advisability of administering a blood transfusion, but he sliped away so rapidly that this was not done. It was said that he suffered from heart disease. which contributed to his quick

Mr. McEntire, who was unmarried, was widely known in this county, where he was born and reared. His home was in the Union community, where he owned two large farms, and where he lived as a boy and young man with his father, Andrew McEntire, who died about a year ago,
