

### Cotton Ginners Get Assurance Of No Red Tape

**Told That There Will Not Be Too Much Red Tape in Bankhead Act Duties**

WASHINGTON, July 5.—Cotton ginners throughout the Southern cotton belt were assured today by Cully Cobb, government cotton chief, there will be "very little red tape" connected with their responsibilities under the Bankhead cotton act.

Responding to numerous communications from ginners complaining about "red tape" which they feared in the compulsory baleage reduction program, Cobb issued a statement clarifying the relation of the act to the ginners.

The Bankhead legislation levied a tax of 50 per cent of the average central market price per pound of lint cotton, which has been determined as 11.34 cents, on all cotton ginned above the 10,469,251 bales of 478 pounds net weight fixed as the maximum to be ginned tax-free. The average central market price may be redetermined from time to time should the Secretary of Agriculture find it advisable. But at no time may the tax be less than five cents a pound.

The ginners will be issued bale tags which they will attach to all cotton ginned this season when the producer surrenders tax exemption certificates covering the amount of the cotton ginned, or when the producer pays the excess baleage tax.

Under the act an affidavit will be required from producers who take their ginned cotton home for storage and postpone payment of the tax. This affidavit may be sworn to before any county agent or secretary of community production control committee. This service will be available without cost to farmers wishing to postpone tax payments.

Many ginners, Cobb said, have the erroneous impression these affidavits must be sworn to before a notary.

Internal Revenue Bureau representatives will visit the gins monthly and administer oaths free in the case of gin returns.

### Utility Company Reduces Its Rates

**Virginia-Carolina Concern Cuts Rates That Will Save Customers \$75,000.**

**(News and Observer)**

Another reduction in public utility rates was announced by State Utilities Commissioner Stanley Winborne yesterday. The reduction, placed into effect on July 1 by the

Virginia Electric and Power Co., will save North Carolina customers about \$75,000 a year.

The company serves a considerable area in northeastern North Carolina, during about eight per cent of its total business in this State. Headquarters are at Roanoke Rapids.

The Virginia company voluntarily reduced its rates two years ago and because of that was not included with other major companies who

reduced rates under agreement with the old Corporation Commission in December, 1932.

The rate reduction amounts to half a cent a kilowatt hour in the lower consumption brackets. The new residential rates are: First 100 kwh. 6.5 cents a kwh; next 150 kwh. 6 cents; next 450 kwh. 4.5 cents and in excess to 700 kwh. 3.5. The minimum charge is \$1 a month.

New combination service rates are being worked out.

### Gaston County Has Sale Of Cotton Mill

**Ground and Building of Old Catawba Spinning Co. Was Owned From Tax Sale.**

**(Gastonia Gazette.)**

The chief business coming before the county commissioners at the Monday morning session of their regular July meeting was the confirmation of the sale of the property of the old Catawba Spinning company, that is Gaston county's part, to the American Yarn and Processing company of Mt. Holly, Mill corporation for \$20,000. The machinery had previously been sold to Floyd C. Todd for \$10,000.

The mill had been bought in at a tax sale jointly by the town of Mt. Holly and county of Gaston, in May, 1933 for unpaid and delinquent taxes. Gaston county's taxes for the years 1929 to 1934, inclusive, amounted to \$8,486.77. Of the total sale price of \$30,000 the town of Mt. Holly realized \$21,131.69 and the county of Gaston \$8,968.31.
