### Drunken Driving Up 300 Per Cent

CHICAGO, July 12.—The Tribune said today that the number of drunken drivers involved in accidents was 300 per cent greater the first half of this year than during parallel months in 1933, and that the rise coincided exactly with the repeal of national prohibition.

This year 14 deaths and injuries to 350 were credited to drunken drivers, compared with three deaths and 83 injuries in the 1933 period.

## May Conceal Tax On Commodities Under New Set-Up

### N. C. Three Per Cent Sales Levy Will Undergo Drastic Change; New Rules Released.

RALEIGH, July 11.—North Carolina's three per cent general sales tax, which has just completed its first year of operation, will be governed by new and revised rules and regulations which have been printed and will be distributed to all registered merchants of the State, Harry McMullen, director, announces. Copies will be furnished on request to all other interested citizens.

In the publication of revised rules, the Revenue Department is making several substantial changes in effect the first year, to be followed during the second year, in which \$8,000,000 is set for collection.

**May Conceal Tax**

The publication makes clear that the tax does not have to be shown as a separate item but may or may not be shown, as the merchant may elect. Provision is made for determining exemptions in one of five ways: sales record, invoice purchases, inventories, percentage basis, storehouse or warehouse billing. Manufacturers or producers in selling their own product become liable for the tax if they engage in retail selling. If the manufacturer or producer sells at wholesale to merchants for resale, no tax is imposed.

To obtain exemption of governmental sales, the merchant is required to take a certificate from the purchasing agency showing purchases made by the governmental agency for which exemption is provided; otherwise, they will be taxable.

Provision is made for taking resale certificates in sales made by certain classes of merchants whose sales are of such character as in some instances may be sales for resale and in other instances sales to consumers. In order to claim a wholesale classification as a sale to merchant for resale, the merchant is required to take from the purchaser a resale certificate, form for which is provided in the regulations.

The regulations provide that the used or secondhand article taken in exchange for a new article.

## Raleigh Will Get Alcohol Tax Unit

### WASHINGTON, July 12.—Changes are to be made in the alcohol tax unit of the Carolinas, which will result in the location of an office at Raleigh, to employ a force of 30 men. The South Carolina branch of the service will hereafter be connected with another group of states while the North Carolina branch will be operated under the supervision of the parent office at Baltimore.

## Road Construction In State Held Up

### Federal Funds Can't Be Used Until Regulations Come From Washington.

RALEIGH, July 12.—Road construction with the \$4,840,941 in federal funds recently granted the state cannot start until regulations for expenditures are received from Washington, E. B. Jeffress, chairman of the state highway and public works commission, stated today.

From a fund of \$9,000,000 last year, the commission has about \$1,500,000 available for new contracts, but all of this money has been allotted to specific projects, Mr. Jeffress said.

At the close of the fiscal year June 30, a total of 6,735 men were employed on 149 projects under construction at an estimated cost of \$5,393,000. Contracts for about \$3,000,000 additional work had been awarded.

The latest federal grant will keep the present road and street construction program on its present scale until the legislature meets next January, Mr. Jeffress stated. The commission is prohibited from spending state money for new construction during the current legislative biennium. Mr. Jeffress expects the federal regulations shortly.

## Rutherford's Levy Predicted As \$1.26

### The estimated tax rate for Rutherford county for the year ending June 30, 1935, is \$1.26 on each \$100 property valuation. The total rate for last year, ending June 30, 1934, was \$1.17.

The estimated property valuation for taxation in the county is \$22,000,000, which is about half the actual valuation. This means at a rate of \$1.26 that it will take about \$27,000 to pay the county's bills for the coming year. Rutherford county has never defaulted in her debt obligations.

## Farm Production Least In 30 Years

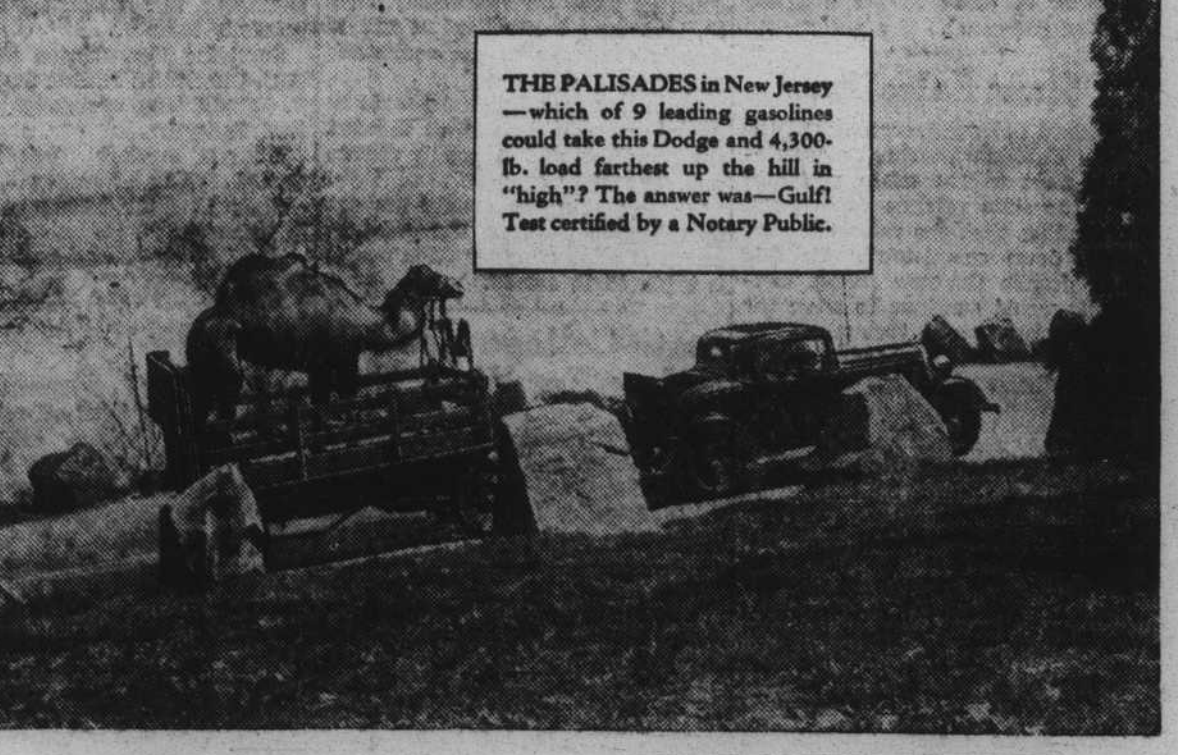
### WASHINGTON, July 12.—The law of weather averages and the generous carryover from the nation's granary probably will enable the AAA to leave its acreage production unchanged for next year.

This was made clear by high agricultural department officials today after they had studied figures of the crop reporting board that showed an estimated production for 1934 lower than any in the past 30 years.

The output of all wheat was estimated by the board at 483,562,000 bushels, a cut of 18,000,000 bushels during the month of June and approximately half the normal production of 886,359,000 bushels.
