NEWTON, Aug. 2.—Following a conference between Mayor Robert J. Shipp and Ross M. Sigmon of Salisbury, state highway commissioner for this district, it was announced here that prospects for resurfacing Highways 10 and 16 within the Newton city limits, with federal funds, were considered bright. The proposed resurfacing will include two sides of the court square, from the extreme end of North Main avenue to the extreme end of South College avenue.
