Johnston Avery Gets New Honor

Tal Heel Newspaperman Is Named Assistant To Murchison In Commerce Department.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.—Another honor went to the fourth estate of the Tar Heel state today when Johnston Avery, formerly of Lenoir and Greensboro, was named executive assistant to Dr. Claudius Temple Murchison, formerly of Chapel Hill, and director of the bureau of interstate and foreign commerce.

Mr. Avery is a graduate of the state university and began his newspaper career on one of the college papers. He then settled down to the daily grind at Lenoir, and was soon recognized as one of the brightest young men in his profession in the state. He attracted state wide notice by expounding enthusiastically the cause of Senator Reynolds, and came to Washington as his secretary and political division.

Boiling Springs Man Licks The Depression By Spreading 4,000 Sandwiches For This Section

Old Man Depression received a terrible blow when B. G. Beason, of Boiling Springs, decided that it could be licked with sandwiches. Out of a job, a family to support, and with a lone \$50 cash and credit to begin with, Mr. Beason opened a sandwich shop in the little junior college town and in little more than six years his shop has metamorphosed into the Cleveland Sandwich company, working more than a dozen employees, making each day more than 4000 sandwiches of some fifteen varieties, which are eaten with relish by customers in a territory of more than a fifty mile radius.

A Spreading Business.

A visit to the sandwich shop will convince the most skeptical that an idea plus management and work will produce death blows to a depression. An array of modern equipment including polished oil stoves, electrically driven food choppers, bread slicers and mixers, and a dozen other instruments of the manager's own invention give evidence of just how thousands of wholesome spreads are prepared each day.

Manager Beason states that from the very beginning, he adopted service and quality as twin trademarks for his business. With four other men in the field all the time he furnishes the service, and to Miss Lou Moore, dietitian and his assistant, since the beginning of the project, goes credit for the quality. Miss Moore directs the activity of some eight or ten young ladies and women of the community as they prepare and mix food, build the sandwiches and wrap them in waxed paper or cellophane and give them proper labels.

Two Barns Struck By Lightning Bolts

Electrical Storm Thursday Afternoon Destroys Structures Of J. F. Gantt.

KINGS MOUNTAIN, Aug. 19.—Two barns on the farm of J. F. Gantt were burned to the ground when struck by lightning during the electric storm of Thursday afternoon. Mr. Gantt lives on highway No. 20 about 3 miles from Kings

Mountain just over the line in Gaston county. One of the barns destroyed was the one in which the stock and feed were housed, the other was a recently built modern milking barn. The stock was removed to safety. However 150 bales of hay and 100 bushels of Irish potatoes were burned. One thousand and twenty-two bushels of wheat in a nearby building was saved. Mr. Gantt stated when interviewed in East Kings Mountain that he had the buildings insured for \$1200 but that amount was hardly sufficient to cover the loss.
