

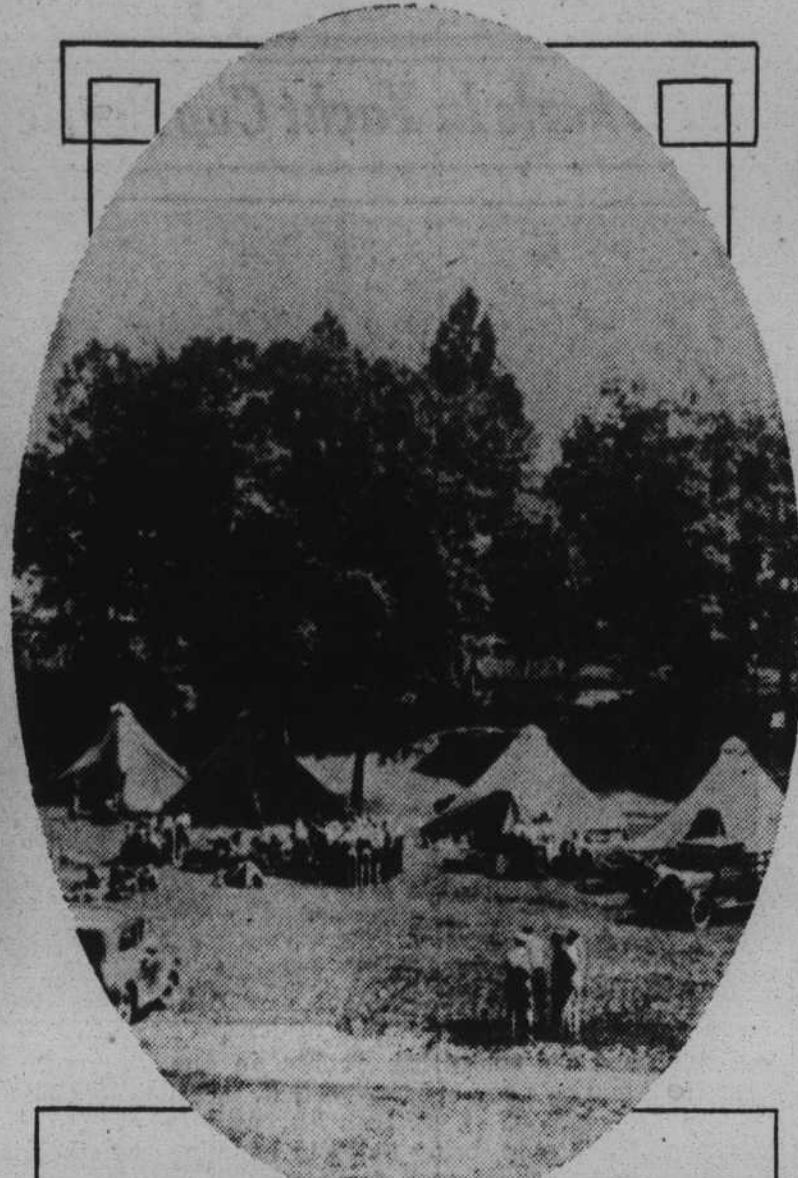
LATE WORLD NEWS TOLD IN PICTURES

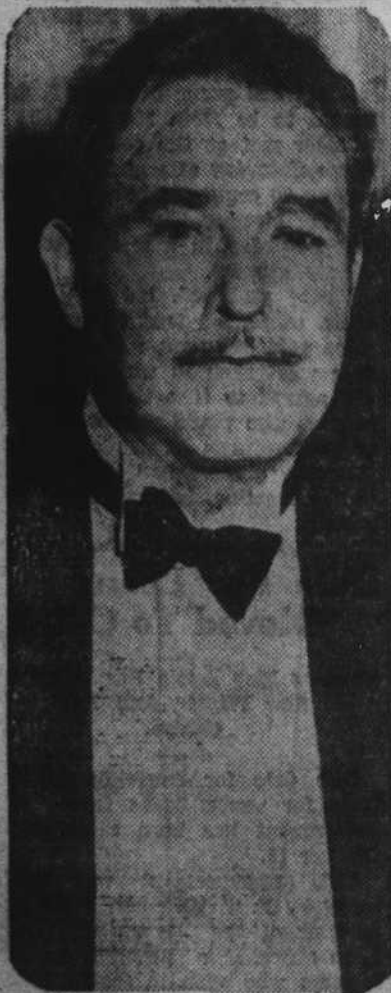

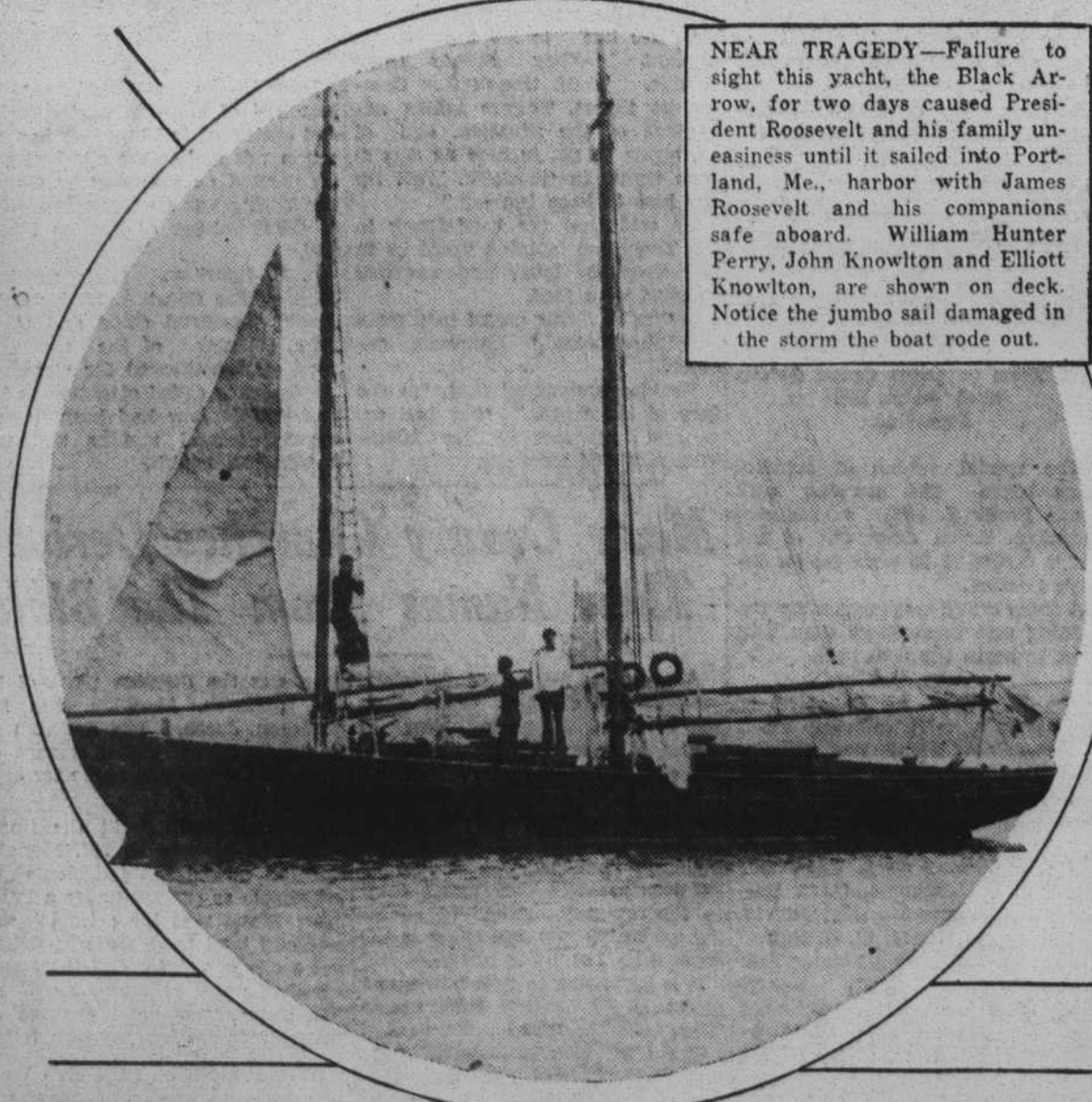

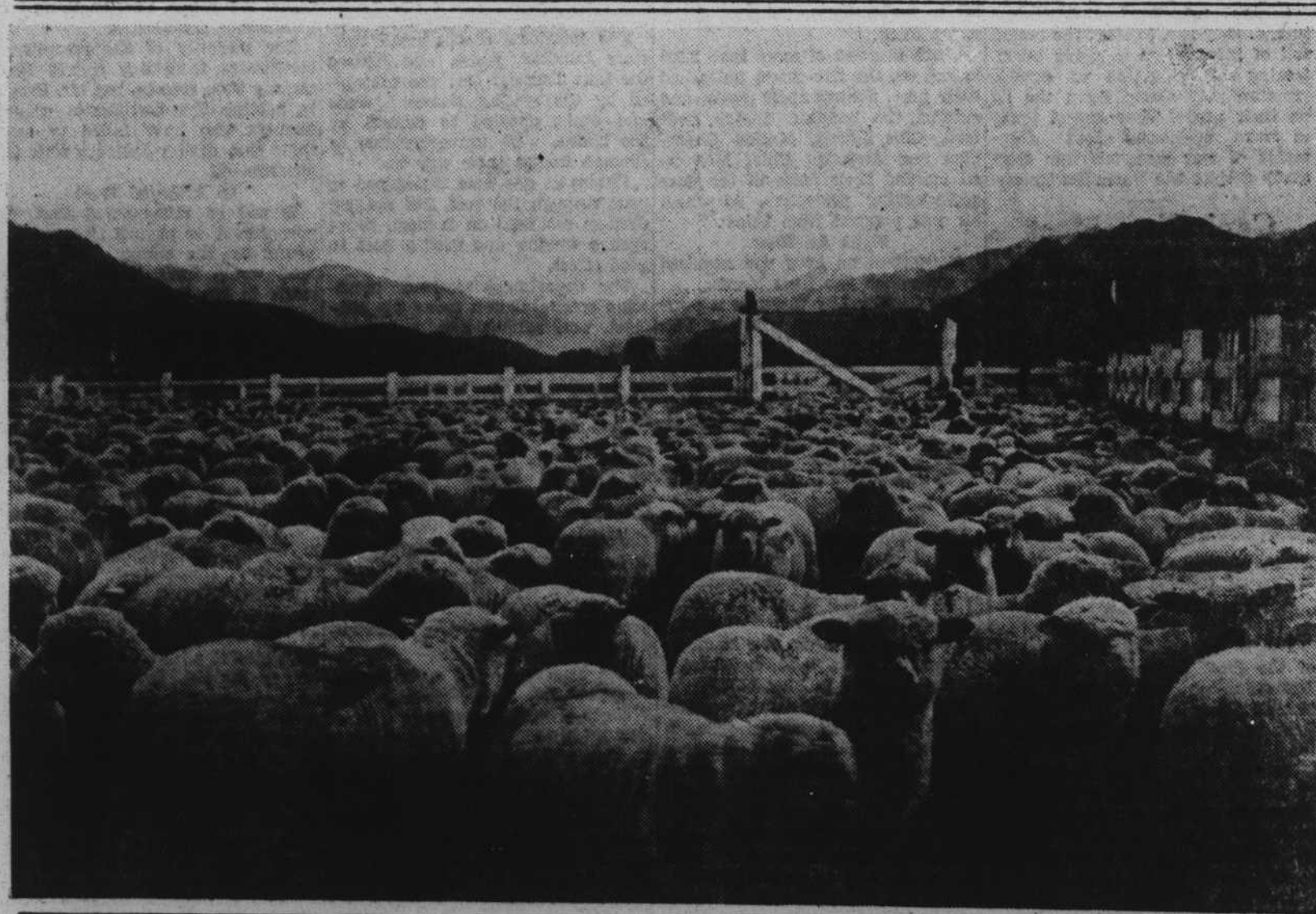
