Two Cent Check Tax Off Jan. 1st

Collector Robertson Announces That Ii Will Not Be Collected After That Date.

revenue act of 1932, will not be levied on and after January 1, it was announced Saturday by C. H. Rob. ertson, collector of internal revenue This means that no tax will be collected on checks presented for payment on or after that date.

Collector Robertson explained that while the tax on checks is heing terminated the tax of 10 per cent on safe deposit box rent, levied by the 1934 revenue act, remains in force until repealed by Congress. Therefore it will be necessary for banks and trust companies to continue collection of the safe deposit box tax and make returns as heretofore required.
