

Hundred and Fifty Guests Feast On Bear Steak at Neisler Banquet

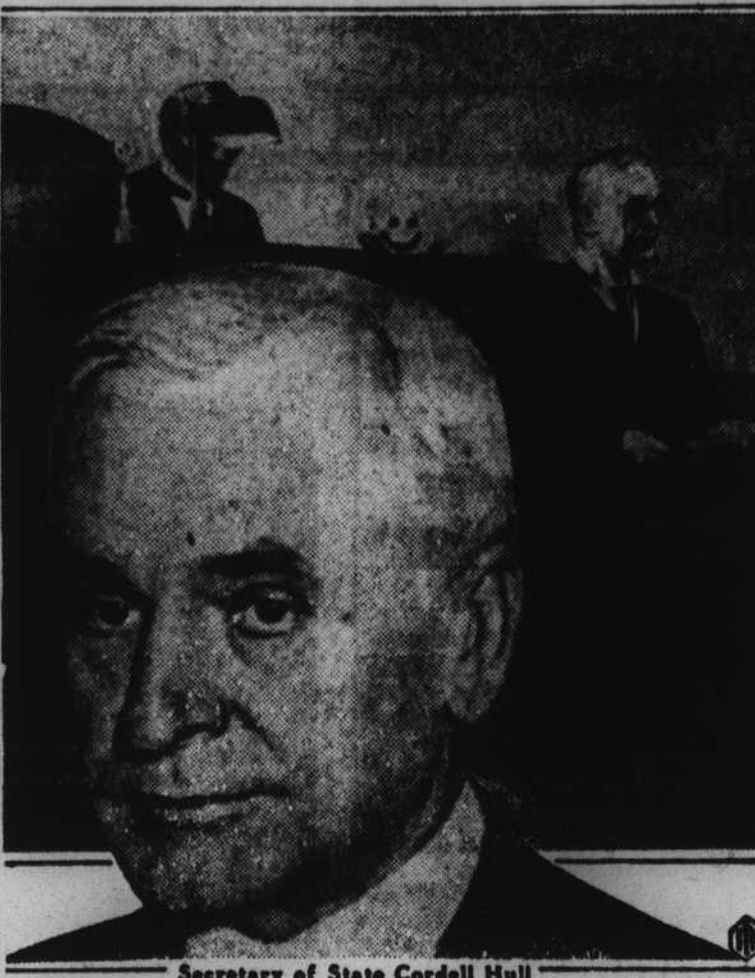
One hundred and fifty guests attended the annual banquet given Saturday night by the management of the Neisler Mills of Kings Mountain.

Sixteen Children Die On Highways

Sixteen little children were among the 107 persons who lost their lives on the highways of North Carolina during the month of October.

The wholesale slaughter established an all-time record for deaths resulting from accidents in which automobiles were involved, according to L. S. Harris, director of the motor vehicle bureau. The total, however, was one one greater than that rolled up in the preceding month, when 106 met violent death.

Statistics compiled in the office of Mr. Harris show that automobile fatalities for the first ten months of this year were 745, which is 107 or exactly the number slain during October, than the total of 647 rolled up for the same period of last year.

Ten of the deaths were caused by hit-and-run drivers, but reckless drivers were involved in 126 of the 806 accidents reported, and 22 of the 126 resulted in fatalities. In addition to those killed, 745 persons received injuries of varying degrees of severity.

Bailey, Reynolds Will Not Join In Fight On M'Ninch

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6.—North Carolina's two senators, although still as much politically opposed to Frank R. McNinch as ever, apparently will not stage a senate fight serious enough to theater confirmation of the Charlotte man as chairman of the federal power commission.

The odds are in favor of Mc-Ninch's confirmation with Senators Bailey and Reynolds silently objecting in the background when his name comes before the senate.

McNinch is considered too much in favor of President Roosevelt, and for Bailey and Reynolds to fight him to the extent of demanding on "personally obnoxious" grounds that he not be confirmed might react against them.

Bailey, who was here this week, declined to divulge what stand he will take when McNinch's name comes up, but he made it clear he was still violently opposed to the man who led the anti-Smith forces to victory in North Carolina in 1928.

Reynolds, shortly after President Roosevelt gave McNinch a recess re-appointment last summer, issued a statement indicating that if President Roosevelt wanted McNinch he, Reynolds, in effect would not stand in the way.

McNinch originally was appointed a member of the power commission by President Hoover. He was elevated to the chairmanship by Roosevelt and subsequently reappointed.

The Charlotte man is considered hand-in-hand with the President's power policy, and he is in exceedingly good graces with the administration.

Mayflower Cup Goes To E. W. Zimmermann

RALEIGH, Dec. 6.—Erich W. Zimmermann, professor of commerce and resources at the University of North Carolina for several years, was awarded the Mayflower Society cup for 1934 at the closing exercises Wednesday of the annual session of the state Literary and Historical Association.

Governor Ehringhaus announced the award and presented the handsome sterling silver replica to Mr. Zimmermann, whose book published during the past year, "World Resources and Industries," was adjudged the best original work of a resident North Carolinian published in the year. The board of award consisted of Professors H. T. Laffer and J. D. Clark of State college and J. M. McConnell and E. F. Shewmaker, of Davidson college. Nearly 40 books were in the competition.

REPAY PRODUCTION LOANS WELL IN TWO CAROLINAS

Some 30,000 farmers in Georgia and the Carolinas have obtained short-term loans from production credit associations this year and already repaid over 93 per cent of the money, according to a statement today (December 7) of Ernest Graham, president of the Production Credit Corporation of Columbia, S. C., now in Washington attending a conference of production credit officials from the 12 Farm Credit Administration districts.

Car Sales Took Drop Last Month

RALEIGH, Dec. 7.—New car sales in North Carolina during November dropped considerably from the record set in October, but were far ahead of sales in the corresponding month last year. The drop is attributable to the short period of use of 1934 licenses, prospective purchasers waiting until December 15, when they may use 1935 licenses, Director L. S. Harris, of the motor vehicle bureau, reports.

New motor vehicles registered in November numbered 3,715, or 3,029 passenger cars and 686 trucks, as against 7,311 cars and 1,905 trucks in October, and as against 2,328 cars and 450 trucks in November, 1933.

Sales to the end of November for the entire year reached 53,461, or 43,075 cars and 10,386 trucks, as against 26,971 cars and 5,935 trucks in the 11 months of 1933, director Harris reported.

Chevrolets led in numbers in November with 1,409 new car sales, others being as follows: Fords, 600; Plymouths, 411; Pontiacs, 98; Buicks, 90; Oldsmobiles, 78; Dodges, 64; Terraplanes, 63; Chryslers, 48; Studebakers, 26, and of the higher priced cars, Cadillacs, one; Packard, five, and LaSalle, five. In trucks, the Chevrolet also led with 315; Fords, 177; Dodges, 108; Internationals, 50.

McDowell Factory Takes 300 Workers

MARION, Dec. 6.—The McDowell Furniture company here, which has been operating on part time for several months, called back its full force of nearly 300 employees Monday to take care of the increasing demands for short time orders.

"We will likely close down for one week during the holidays to make necessary adjustment and repairs," R. B. Crisp, secretary and general manager of the company said Monday, "and then we will resume business at full capacity production. While some large orders in prospect have not yet been definitely closed, we are reasonably sure now that, by January 1, we will have booked sufficient business to keep the plant going at full capacity until far up into the summer."
