

Shelby Boats Of Unusual Stock Of American Antiques Such As Is Hard To Find In The South

Over on North Morgan street is one of the largest and most varied stocks of American antiques in the Southeast. The owner is Mrs. Paul Webb. For several years she has been dealing in antiques and gradually the stock has grown to such an extent that a new building has been erected. Mrs. Webb calls it the "Cabin" and it stands to the rear of the old Roberts home which has been repainted and refreshed. A new picket fence has been built around the yard.

Scores of prominent people from distant points are drawn to Shelby by Mrs. Webb's antique shop. Men and women who make a study of antiques and revel in adding to their collection, come to look over her stock and buy.

The approach from the street to the steps of the "big house" is laid with old mill stones, gathered from here and there. Inside the dwelling, every room is filled to capacity with a choice collection and Mrs. Webb spends most of her time in their association. A Mr. Alexander is engaged in repair and refinish antique furniture which Mrs. Webb acquires the country for.

Chippendale, Hepplewhite and Duncan-Phyfe are the furniture designs in which she specializes. It is interesting to see the "love-seats" of other days, the handcarved chairs, sofas, corner-cupboards, wire chests, tavern tables, chests of drawers, etc., and recall to mind the old Southern men and women who made daily use of them.

One of Mrs. Webb's choicest pieces is a concave chest of drawers, inlaid. It merits a place in a museum. Then the beautiful old paintings, old Sheffield silver, bottles and vases of the Staffordshire, England, pattern imported to this country in its early days for use in the homes of the rich. Only the wealthy could afford such finery.

A large stock of mirrors, some Sheraton patterns with gold leaf, picture frames for oil paintings, portraits and prints are to be found in her collection. Then there are hundreds of pieces of glassware and china that are the envy of those who know genuine antique. Especially is Mrs. Webb proud of two beautiful alabaster vases that are carved in most delicate fashion and stand fully two feet high on a chest of drawers.

In the early days of this Republic, the people were forced to devise their own conveniences. One of the most unusual pieces is a wide rocking chair, wide enough to accommodate three people. It was known as a "cradle rocker" and was devised for mother to rock her babe by propelling the cradle-chair with her feet, leaving her hands free to knit and sew. On one end of the rocker seat was built a babe's cradle. Here she would deposit her young, while she sat on the other end of the seat and rocked herself and her babe.

Lincolnton Marks 149th Birthday; Chartered In 1785

Is One Of Oldest Towns In This Part Of State, Antedating Charlotte And Shelby.

The town of Lincolnton, capital of the mother county of both Cleveland and Rutherford, celebrated on Friday of last week her 149th birthday. Lincolnton, one of the oldest towns in western North Carolina, ante-dates Charlotte and Shelby by a number of years, and received a grant for the land on which the towns now stands on Dec. 14, 1785, just five years after the battle of Ramseur's Mill.

The original grant for the town was made to "Joseph Dixon in trust for the citizens of Lincoln county." Dixon, John Carruth, John Wilson, Joseph Steel and Nicholas Friday were members of a body of commissioners appointed by the general assembly to locate the county town, which originally com-

prised 300 acres of "vacant and unappropriated land lying between the lines of Christian Rinehardt and Phillip Cansler on both sides of the wagon road leading from the Tuckasee ford to Ramseur's mill, and including the works of the road leading to Cansler's Mill.

Plans for a grand sesqui-centennial celebration in Lincolnton next year are already under way.

Smith Is Chairman of Celebration Group

Superintendent of Shelby Schools B. L. Smith left this morning for Raleigh to attend a meeting of the committee on the celebration of the centennial of public education in North Carolina. Mr. Smith is chairman of the committee.

Plans for the celebration will be made two years in advance of the celebration in January, 1937. That month marks the 150th anniversary of the distribution of four million dollars in federal funds in this state for public education, and the passage of a resolution by the legislature setting up the machinery for a state school system.
