Sheffield also points out that the cotton section of the AAA will have about 130 million dollars available to pay rental and parity payments this year. This means that if every cotton grower in the south signed an adjustment contract, the cotton section could pay each one at the rate set. Therefore as a matter of crop insurance, Mr. Sheffield believes it a wise plan for all growers to sign contracts. About 72,000 persons in North Carolina are already under contract having signed a two-year paper last spring; but, there are some 40,000 additional growers who are not under contract. Many of these can sign this year and comply with the requirements to get the rental and benefit payments available.


