The text of the bill is as follows: "Section 1. That in all tax foreclosure suits in Cleveland county, if it shall appear to the court that it is necessary to make additional parties to said action, in order to include all lien holders and other parties interested in the property asked to be sold under said tax foreclosure suit, and if it shall appear to the court that said tax foreclosure suit was orginally brought or filed within the time allowed by law against the person in whose name said property was listed for taxation, then the court shall have full power and authority at any time prior to the final judgment in said action to order that any person, firm, or corporation, who may be interested, as lien holder or otherwise, in the property about to said action, and upon the service of lawful summons upon said person, firm or corporation, the final judgment of the court shall be as binding upon such person, firm, 'or corporation as if he or it had been a party at the time the action was

That none of the proisions of chapter five hundred and sixty of the Public Laws of one thousand nine hundred and thirtythree relating to or limiting the amount of cost and expenses to be charged against the taxpayer or the Cleveland county or any municipalproperty foreclosed shall apply to ty located therein.
