U. S. To Purchase Kings Mountain Acerage For Park

Government Will Buy Tract In S. C.

To Become National Military Park And Recreational

Decision to purchase more than 6,000 acres near the historic Kings Mountain battleground for development as a military park and recreational center was announced yesterday by Harry L. Hopkins, federal re-

The land is in South Carolina, in York and Cherokee counties. Part of the acreage includes the battlefield itself and will be set aside as a national military park, to be administered by the national park

Recreational Park.
Remainder of the acreage, which is unsatisfactory for use as agricultural lands will be developed into a recreational center with manage ment in the hands of the South

Carolina state forestry com All lands to be acquired for the project, which has been pending nore than a year, have been voluntarily offered for sale by the owners. Hapkins said.
