

### Scholl in Race For Bulwinkle's Seat in Congress

The announcement Monday of William F. Scholl, one of Mecklenburg's three representatives in the lower house of the General assembly, that he would make the race for the Democratic nomination for congress in 1936—which had been definitely forecast—puts two candidates in the field more than a year before the primary is to be held.

The other candidate is the man whom Mr. Scholl must defeat if he gets to Washington, Maj. A. L. Bulwinkle, incumbent, who has been since 1920, with the exception of 1928 when he was defeated by C. A. Jones, of Lincoln, Republican. Mr. Bulwinkle has already announced he would seek his eighth term.

Hamilton C. Jones, Charlotte law year and twice an unsuccessful candidate for the nomination against Major Bulwinkle, may also be in the race, but if he announces it will be deferred for several months, his friends are confident. In each of the two races, Mr. Jones gave the congressmen a terrific fight for the honor.

### Strikers Vote To Accept Peace Offer

COLEDO, O., May 17.—Striking transmission makers of the local Chevrolet plant voted tonight to accept a peace proposal worked out by A. F. of L. leaders, Federal labor committees, company officials and Federal mediators.

The vote was 732 for acceptance and 385 for rejection.



This is a state-wide contest, the silver cup and cash award to be presented annually over a period of five years to the writer whose story possesses greatest merit in the opinion of a committee of competent judges entirely unconnected with the Writers' Club of Charlotte. In the event of one person winning the cup for three consecutive times, the contest is automatically closed and the cup becomes the property of the winner.

BEAUFORT, May 17.—Until citizens from all parts of Carteret county give their views at a special meeting to be held here Monday, May 20, it is uncertain whether a special election will be held in Carteret to decide the question of legal liquor.

Members of the county board of commissioners today deferred calling the liquor referendum despite the wishes of a large delegation which today urged the election. The commissioners decided to wait until both wets and dries had a chance to present their views on the question.

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### Gastonia Launches Anti-Wreck Policy

GASTONIA, May 17.—As the result of an increasing number of traffic accidents in and around Gastonia, the city council announced it had ordered launched immediately an intensive war on reckless driving.

"There are entirely too many accidents in the city," said Mayor E. B. Denny. "There is a crash at some street corner nearly every day, and it appears that our automobile drivers are becoming grossly careless and reckless in the manipulation of their cars."

After a lengthy discussion, the council instructed City Manager H. Rutter to give the city police department orders to institute a continuous campaign to enforce all traffic laws to the letter. It was emphasized that this was not to be a spasmodic campaign, but one in active enforcement 24 hours every day.
