Diplomas were awarded to 70 graduates, the largest number of graduates the Shelby high school has ever turned out, Monday night when the finals were held in the auditorium before an audience that packed every inch of space. The use of college caps and gowns was introduced for the first time this year.

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S. C. Constabulary Gets Liquor Job

COLUMBIA, S. C., June 7.—Gov. Olin D. Johnson organized his state constabulary this week and charged it with the prime responsibility of enforcing the new liquor law in a speech at a state-wide conference of law enforcement officers here.

He told several scores of officers assembled in the hall of the house of representatives that "South Carolina is undertaking a big proposition in legalizing liquor" and that "many questions" concerning the new law would arise in its enforcement.

KING BEE OF LINCOLN MEETS MATCH IN WRECK

George Powell, of Lincoln county, known as the "King Bee," lies in a Lincoln-ton hospital with serious injuries, as a result of an automobile turning over on the Newton-Taylorsville highway about 5:30 Tuesday afternoon. The accident occurred a few miles south of Taylorsville.

Powell was arraigned in Catawba county recorder's court last February on the charge of transporting and operating a smoke screen. He paid out of the liquor case, but is now under heavy bond for his appearance in Catawba county superior court in July to answer the smoke screen charge.
