General fund 10 cents, poor fund 7 cents, debt service 7 cents, capital outlay 2 cents; maintenance 2 cents and school debt service 8

All road tax rates remain the same with the exception of the No. g Lawndale district, in which there is a jump from 7 to 10 cents.


