

Another depay has extended the hife expectations of Louis Sentel!.. The Cleveland county man, convictted of the murder of Florence Jones. was to have died on July 12, but has been granted a reprieve because of construction work under way at the prison.

Four prisoners were scheduled to die on that day, but it is likely that only two will be executed. There has never been a quadruple execution in the history of the state, and only twice have three condemned men been electricuted in one day.



Yet, to balance the proposed expenditures and to meet mean osses, they may have an increase. The budget for last vear was \$261,476.68, for the operation of all departments, and the navment of bonds and interests. At the and of the fiscal year, as Mayor Sim McMurry turned over the books to the new administration, he left a bank balance of \$16,000. That's a far ory from the county's big account of \$100,000 each on hand.

Two revenue losses ass faced and must be met some way. First, there's a 16 per cent seduction in light and power rates to the conumer, which, when worked out in relation to the city and the Duke Power company, means almost a 30 percent reduction in revenue from that source. Then there is the loss due to removal of "corporate ex-cess" by the recent legislature. That will amount to about \$5,700, about twice as much as was estimated.


