Text: Acts 20:33-35; Philippians 4:14-13

RALEIGH, Aug. 26.—In July, as compared with July last year, North Carolina's death rate dropped from 10.7 to 8.7, deaths from 2,913 to 2,431; births dropped from 6,427 to 6,215, rate from 23.6 to 23.3; infant deaths dropped from 534 to 448, rate from 83.1 to 72.1 per 1,000 live births; and maternal deaths increased from 39 to 41, rate from 6.1 to 6.6 per 1,000 live births.
