

Real College Game Of Football Slated For Shelby Saturday

Boiling Springs Bulldogs Find Winning Man Is Sub; Will Take On Lees-McRae At Cloth Mill Park In Night Game

Discovering a sub who can run and receive passes with the air of a veteran, Coach Eddie Lawhon will lead his Boiling Springs Bulldogs against Lees-McRae junior college here Saturday night at the athletic park of the Cleveland Cloth Mill.

This game will be the first and perhaps only real college game to be played this season in the vicinity of Shelby and hundreds of fans are expected to turn out for the performance.

Both teams will be seeking their first college victory, and both teams have made most creditable showings against the strongest junior college outfits in the state.

The Bulldogs loss to Belmont Abbey Saturday was one of the tricks of football as the local team ran up nine first downs to the Abbey's six, and DePriest made the most sensational run of the game, a gain of 51 yards. Most of the team have just begun to find themselves, and are expected to be at their best for the home game.

Lees McRae will be led by a veteran Shade Greene, a charging line and a fast backfield. A county lad, Hank Wilson, of Kings Mountain has been kicking up the dust exceedingly well for the visitors.

The game will begin Saturday night at 8 o'clock.

Dueling Backs Of Duke, Auburn To Clash Friday

DURHAM, Oct. 23.—A bevy of the south's outstanding backs will fly into action in Duke stadium Friday when the once-upset Blue Devils go against Auburn's upsetting Plaminem.

Held in check by Georgia Tech's battling forwards Friday, the Duke leather-luggers should be ready to return to form Saturday and turn in some of the same tactics that gave them a total of 1,304 yards in their first four games this season.

Duke supporters cannot feel that such an array of ball-carriers such as the Blue Devils boast this season can be held down for two weeks. Ace Parker, Jack Alexander, Julie Ward and their sophomore substitutes—Elmore Hackney, Harwood Smith and Herb Hudgins—should be ready to deliver the mail Friday.

Outside of the Tennessee game, the Auburn backs have been "air-tight" out plenty this season. They ran Tulane's fine team off the field and last week gave Kentucky a lesson in ground-gaining by picking up a total of 315 yards in runs from the line of scrimmage.

Water Project Is Not Approved Yet

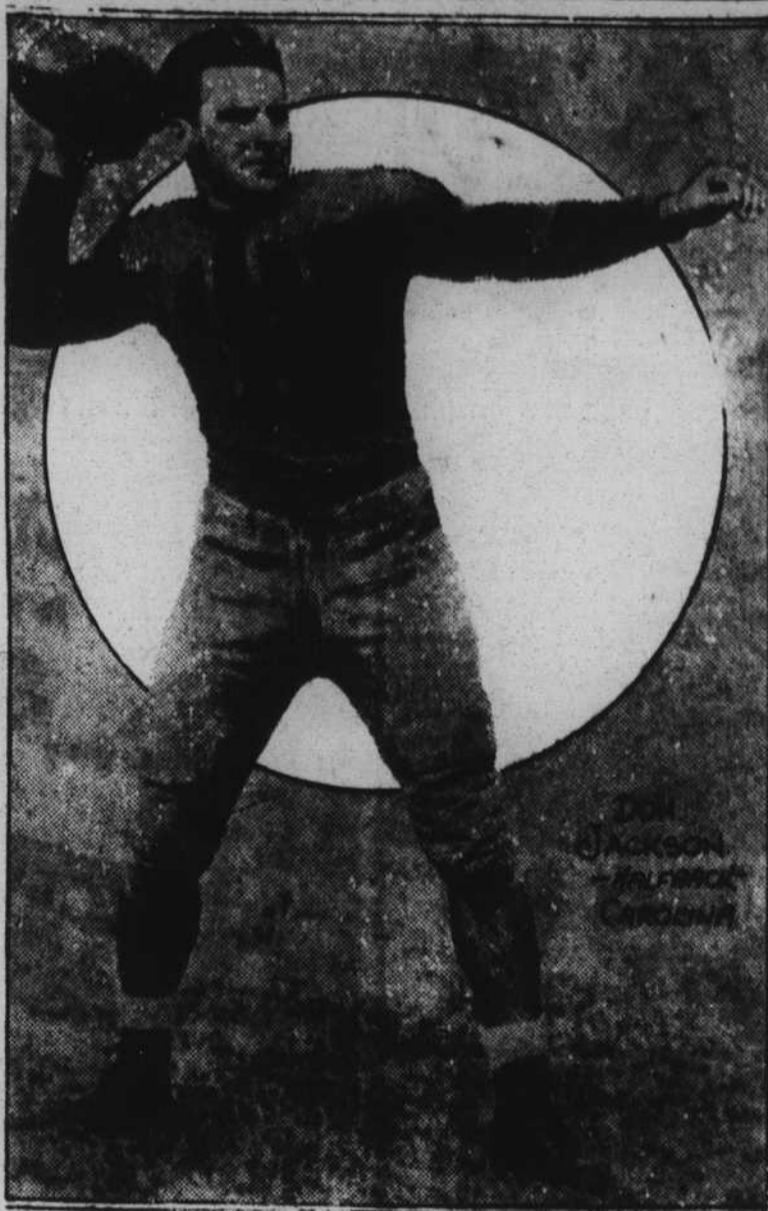

Thinking the local water project had been approved according to official notice, Shelby put in its order for material with which to do the job and shipment has been made. Baldwin Asks Re-Armament Parleys Soon

LONDON, Oct. 23.—(AP)—Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin told the House of Commons today he would go before the people for support of a rearmament conference before the elections of November 14.
"In the interest of world peace it is essential that our defensive services should be stronger than they are today," he said. "I will not pursue a policy or be responsible for the government of this country if I am not given the power to remedy these defects in our defensive services that have come about since the war."
Prime Minister Baldwin's declaration for the strengthening of defensive services was received with cheers by members of parliament.

lar day the grower sells will be determined on basis of average prices at 10 prices at various locations over the south, such as New Orleans, Galveston, Norfolk and others.
Paid This Year
Growers who are this year signers in the reduction program will be paid this year, but growers who are not signed will not be paid until they have actually complied with next year's program.
Forms on which to apply will be supplied to growers, buyers and ginners as soon as they arrive. There will be five different forms and each sale on a different day will require a separate form. The county will likely use close to 100,000 blanks said Mr. Wilkins.
Remember This
"A very important thing to remember," said the agent, "is that the extra money can be applied for only on the actual Bankhead allotment of the grower. The person who made application for the tax

exemption certificates will also apply for the adjustment payment."
At the present time not a single bale of cotton has been consigned to government care at the local warehouse, farmers preferring to sell now and take the adjustment payment later. Cotton prices have ranged this fall from ten to eleven cents for middling 7-8 inch staple.
