Representatives Of Red Cross To Convene Tuesday

Sub-Committee and Community Chairmen Gather At Court House At 3:00.

A completely organized county for the annual Red Cross roll call is the goal this week of Henry B. Edwards, president, who has announced a meeting of representatives from nearly every community in the county.

Strato Flight Is Under Way At Rapid City

Capt. A. W. Stevens reported at 10 o'clock the strato balloon had reached 74,000 feet setting a new unofficial world altitude record, surpassing even the mark set in 1864 by three Russian fliers.

RAPID CITY, S. D., Nov. 11.—Explorer, II, the world's largest balloon, took off at 7 A. M. Mountain Standard Time, on a journey into the stratosphere for scientific exploration, hoping to reach 70,000 feet and possibly a new altitude record.

Culminating six weeks wait for perfect weather, the giant craft rose successfully from the rock wall of natural bowl, 11 miles southwest of here, about 2 hours behind schedule.

Rising approximately 600 feet a minute the bag quickly cleared the 100 foot rock wall of the flight base. Then moved over the hills a mile south and east. Capt. O. A. Anderson, pilot, dropped several bags of ballast when it appeared the balloon might come too near the ground on the top of the bowl, but the bag successfully cleared the obstacle.

Capt. Anderson, accompanied by Capt. A. W. Stevens, commander of the scientific expedition, expected to reach about 5:45 P. M., Mountain Standard time.

Capt. Stevens said they planned to rise to about 83,000 feet before beginning their observation.

Scientific observation was the primary purpose of the flight, sponsored by the National Geographic Society and the U. S. Army corps, officials.
