Ontario Makes Plans To Build A Playground For Quintuplets

CALLANDER, Ont., Feb. 12.—The government of Ontario, acting for the guardians of the Dionne quintuplets, disclosed it was planning a playground for the little girls next to the Defoe hospital.

In each case, the value of the land will be determined by Judge T. F. Battle of North Bay, and the guardians will pay the cost.

The playground is to be surrounded by a high wire fence covered with a substance devised by Prof. W. E. Blatz of the University of Toronto, which permits visitors

to look in but prevents the children from seeing the curious watchers.

Beef Is On Way In Big Quantity

More good beef will go to market in the first four months of 1936 than in the same months of 1935, if cattle feeders carry out their first-year plans, says the Bureau of Agricultural Economics.

But cattle in the feed lot at the first of this year in the 11 corn belt states numbered 25 to 30 percent less than the 5-year average, although 41 percent greater than last year, the largest increase in the 14 years that reports have been made.

Feed-lot operations increased about 48 percent in the western corn belt as compared to about 29

percent in the eastern corn belt. Greatest percentage increases were South Dakota, 220; Nebraska, 155; Missouri, 160; and Kansas, 150.

Cattle on feed in the 11 Western states, Texas and Oklahoma on January 1 numbered 78 per cent more than those on feed a year ago and nearly one-third larger than the average for the five years, 1930 to 1934.

Refuse Clemency To Col. Luke Lea

RALEIGH, Feb. 12.—Governor E. King has refused a request that clemency be extended at this time to Luke Lea, former United States senator from Tennessee, so that Lea might accept a position with the Cincinnati baseball team and go on the club's spring training trip to Puerto Rico.

Lea is serving six to ten years in state's prison for violation of state banking laws in connection with the failure of the Central Bank and Trust company of Asheville several years ago.

After a lengthy formal hearing in the case last year Lea's petition for a pardon or commutation was denied.

Sentenced in 1921, Lea did not enter prison until May 1934 as his case was fought through to the United States Supreme Court.

Police Seek Negro On Assault Charge

LENOIR, Feb. 12.—Police late Monday night were searching for an unidentified negro man who criminally assaulted a Lenoir young woman earlier in the night.

The girl was walking across the yard of East Harper school, on her way to visit a neighbor, when the attacker jumped from behind a hedge and overpowered her. She was able to give officers a fairly good description of the man.

Cold Weather Hard On Germs, Insects

COLUMBIA, S. C., Feb. 12.—Since cold weather has harsher effect on germs and germ-carrying insects than it has on humans, the people of South Carolina are suffering less than usual from sickness this winter.

Dr. James A. Hayne, state health officer, disclosed cold weather as a "splendid preventative" for certain types of disease which usually harass South Carolinians.

He cited the fact that for January only 4,816 cases of sickness were reported in the state as compared with 12,412 for January, 1935.

Weather bureau officials described the present winter as the second coldest on record since the bureau

was established in 1887. The average temperature for December and January was 41.2 degrees as compared with 38 degrees for the same two months in 1917-18—the coldest on record.

Five persons have been reported frozen to death in South Carolina during December and January.
