

Girl On Picnic Loses Both Feet

High School Girl In Mecklenburg Is Badly Injured; Seven Taken To Hospital.

CHARLOTTE, May 11.—A sedan loaded with youthful picnickers plowed into the rear of a truck, also carrying members of the same party, Saturday injuring seven persons so severely they required hospital treatment, and others less seriously.

Nellie Abernethy, of high school age, lost both feet as an amputation was necessary because of her hurts. W. D. Cox, driver of the sedan which crashed into the truck as some occupants of the leading vehicle sat with their feet hanging from the back, was unconscious in a hospital at Davidson. Police said he was apparently blinded by the dust thrown up by the truck.

The accident occurred 16 miles from Charlotte in the Long Creek community.

Others in hospitals were listed as: Mary Dunn and Edwards Moss, in Charlotte; Maury Kines, Annie Louise Drum and Harley Sherrill, in Mooresville.

RUTHERFORDTON, May 11.—An automobile wreck about 11 o'clock yesterday morning on the Chimney Rock road, three miles west of here caused the death of Mrs. A. C. Brown of Concord, wife of a prominent citizen and banker, and sent Archie Smith to the Rutherford hospital. He will recover, unless complications set in. In the car were Miss Virginia McAllister, driver, and Archie Smith of Mt. Pleasant, near Concord, and Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Brown of Concord. They were riding in a sedan and lost control of the car, which turned over. All the occupants were slightly injured. Mr. Smith is in the hospital while the other two were able to proceed home. Mrs. Brown was rushed to the Rutherford hospital where she died an hour later without regaining consciousness. She died of internal injuries.
