SPORTS SLANTS

Baseball fans, past and present, take time out to drop in and talk about the game with Red Dooin, one of the outstanding catchers in the National league a generation ago, and manager of the Phillies from 1908 through 1912. Dooin, with his new battery made, Andy Grob, runs a tavern in Atlantic City and is ever-willing to pause and talk baseball.

The close race in the National league was being discussed when we dropped in to say hello.

"I like the St. Louis Cardinals," said Dooin. "They're the only major league team with anything like the spirit the old-time teams showed. Spirit will win the pennant for them."

Dooin laughed when it was suggested that Dizzy Dean was likely to do himself permanent harm with the work-home program he is following in trying to pitch the Cards to the pennant.

"Why, it will make a real pitcher out of him," explained Red. "All good pitchers of the past did the same thing—that's what made 'em great. Alexander, Matty, Johnson, to name just a few, worked out of turn when necessary and suffered no ill effects. The trouble with most pitchers today is that they don't work often enough to keep their control razor sharp. And managers yank them today as soon as the opposing team gets a couple of successive hits instead of giving the pitchers a chance to work out their own salvation on the mound."

Purchased Alex The Great.
Dooin ought to know something about pitchers, for it was he who bought Grover Cleveland Alexander for the Phillies for the magnificent sum of \$700. Patsy O'Rourke, still a scout for the Phils, stepped Red off when Alexander was playing with Syracuse. Dooin watched the pitcher work and promptly signed him to a Philadelphia contract.

Partial blame for the scarcity of real pitching in the majors today, Dooin figures, is due to the lack of capable catching talent. A catcher can make or break a pitcher—especially a young hurler—the tavern-keeper thinks.

"I have to laugh when I watch some of these so-called catchers work behind the plate these days," Dooin says. "They squat way back of the plate and give the pitcher no target to throw at. In my day the catcher worked right up close to the plate. He would reach out and touch the batter to gauge his distance."

Caddled Catchers.
The decline of base-stealing, too has taken the keen edge off the catcher's job. A few years ago every man on base was a potential burglar and the catcher had to be ready to head him off. No catcher ever remained long in the big show unless he could cope with the base runners. That is no cinch when you stop and consider that the average fast runner can cover the distance between first and second in three seconds. That means that in that time the pitcher has to deliver the ball, the catcher must receive it and throw it to the second-base man, who has to tag the runner—it takes speed and accuracy.

"In the old days, when players were allowed to mix all sorts of rivalries developed," says Dooin. "George Gibson of the Pirates and I used to have quite a time seeing who would be the first to catch 145 games or so a season. We took real pride in our work and, let me tell you, it took a serious injury to keep us out of the lineup. We didn't have the string of utility players they have today, either."

The Cincinnati Reds tried to sign Dooin as a coach a couple of seasons ago but business was good and Red felt that he could get enough baseball by taking in an occasional league game on his life-time pass, and by talking the game with old-timers and friends who drop in. And besides, according to Red, the game isn't the same today.

Soviet Government Would Out Trotzky
MOSCOW, Aug. 31.—The Soviet government demanded today that Norway expel Leon Trotzky, but the Soviet did not ask his return to Russia. It was authoritatively learned today.

The Soviet instructed its representatives in Oslo to make demands on the Norwegian government charging that Trotzky broke his pledge not to engage in counter-revolutionary plots during his stay in Norway.

Oslo, Trotzky was held under police guard in his home, but the Norwegian government found it lacked power to expel the one-time Russian revolutionary leader until another nation volunteers to admit him.

"Millionaire Pauper" Loses Title At Last

MEMPHIS, Tenn.—(P)—Memphis "millionaire pauper" has lost his title. No longer is Tom Collier either a millionaire or a pauper.

Of the Collier family's original 350-acre tract in the heart of Memphis' exclusive residential suburbs which he was unable to sell or develop because it was encumbered with tax claims:

Collier, his mother, Mrs. Alice Treveyan Collier, and a brother and sister retain clear title to 80 acres, their old home and a few other pieces of real estate, the total worth some \$250,000.

Memphis and Shelby county get more than 200 acres, mostly undeveloped, in settlement of claims for taxes, penalties, interest and attorney's fees amounting to \$750,000.

And Tennessee will receive from the city and county a cash settlement for its \$18,000 tax claim against the Collier property.

With this agreement ends the 30-year battle "Fighting Tom" Collier, "champion of lost causes," has waged almost single-handed against the city, county and state to balk collection of taxes he charged were extortion and unfairly assessed.

Collier started his fight in 1906. Since then he has filed and fought out hundreds of tax suits. Most of his victories have been in the state supreme court; his defeats in the county courts.

Twice he has stood on the court house steps, flaunting a flaming red tie as a battle banner, and watched his property auctioned. Both times he regained control of it through supreme court reversals.

A short time ago he called a truce. Substituting a somber black tie for his red one, he "talked turkey" with the city.

Fifty-nine years old, Collier still holds to a life-long habit of running three miles barefoot several mornings each week, which may be responsible for victories in half a dozen physical encounters with political and legal foes, which often landed him in jail.

"Well, I got a 25-cent dinner out of the city—that's more than they have gotten out of me in 25 years of trying," he said after one of his trips to jail.

Another time he threatened to announce his candidacy for the mayoralty from behind the bars.

"I'll announce as the people's jail bird candidate," he asserted.
