
### Morning Cotton LETTER

#### Spain Battlefield States Del Vayo

Says Future Wars Will Be For Democracy Against Oppression.

By Associated Press

GENEVA, Sept. 25.-The Spaniard Julio Alvarez del Vayo told the League of Nations assembly today: "The bloodstained soil of Spain already is the battlefield of world war."

In what delegates construed as an attack on Germany, Italy and Portugal for allegedly arming the Spanish insurgents, the Madrid envoy warned the assembly statesmen that "future wars will not be a conflict betwen states."

Future Wars Instead he said the battle will be between two groups of ideas, be-Ween "democracy and oppression." Considerable applause followed the conclusion of his speech.
