New Fee Schedule Simpler; Some Will Be Reduced

A revision of the county's building fee schedule should be easier to understand and will also result in smaller fees for some construction projects, according to Brunswick County Planning Director John Harvey.

However, new fees were added for several inspections required by the state that were not previously included on the schedule.

Commissioners approved the revisions at their Monday night meeting. Harvey said the changes came about after Commissioner Benny Ludlum pointed out that there was a misconception that the method used to determine values for projects would make its way into the tax revaluation.

The revised schedule is based on simpler formulas.

With the new schedule, for example, there would be no charge for building construction of heated or air conditioned spaces 300 square feet in size or less. Currently the charge is

Also, a slight reduction results for asphalt drives and parking lots, now in a separate category. Concrete work remains in the uncovered space category, for which the charge is slightly higher.

New items include a \$20 charge for inspecting the new foundation for a house that has been moved; a nocharge permit for tents used no more than 30 days; and a charge of 25 cents per linear foot for inspecting retaining walls, seawalls and bulkheads. Under plumbing, the county will now charge a \$3 per space fee for inspecting travel trailer and recreational

vehicle spaces, with a \$10 minimum.

Also, the county will now use the ASCS office's determination of whether a structure qualifies as a farm building. Harvey said this move would open up the category to smaller acreages not considered farms by the tax office.

Harvey said the local home builders association had endorsed the revisions.

In other business, commissioners recessed their meeting until 1 p.m. on Oct. 6, at which time they will begin interviewing applicants for a programmer analyst position. On Oct. 7, beginning at 10 a.m., they will interview applicants for a new soil scientist position.
