Legislature And EMC Contend Over Waters

A state legislative study commis-sion on coastal water quality and the Environmental Management Con-mission may both have something to say about coastal water quality.

In its Dec. I meeting, the study commission revised recommenda-tions from the EMC regarding handi-ing of these waters, giving some authority to the environmentalists, It vill present its recommendations to

the General Assembly in February.
It will ask the legislature, among other things, to direct EMC to adopt a new classification system for coastal waters, a turnaround from the original plan for the legislature to take this action.

However, under current proposals

however, under current proposals of the study commission, the legislature would define the concept of "existing use" of coastal waters, which is key to determining classification.

LaDane Bullington, member of the Coastal Resources Commission Advisory Council, said the legislature should be the body to set up standards for classifications. "They need to make these policy decisions, then the Natural Resources and Community Development department will apply them in setting up a classification system."
