Dr. Tom Loftfield will discuss archaeological evidence found at Bald Head Island during the 1986 UNCW field school at New Hanover County Museum of the Lower Cape Fear, Sunday, Jan. 11 at 2:30 p.m.

The summer field school was held in June, 1986. The month-long project sponsored by Bald Head Island Ltd. concentrated its work around the "Old Baldy" lighthouse and the keeper's cottages that were part of the lighthouse complex.

Dr. Loftfield will use slides to explain the archaeological dig and talk about the significance of the artifacts found at the site. He will be available



Area telephone customers who tried to make operator assisted catis monday were out of luck, at least if they dialed during normal business

Russell Price, general manager of Atlantic Telephone Membership Corp. in Shallotte, said operator services trunks were out of service from 9 a.m. Monday until around 6 p.m. while repairs were made to a severed fiber optics cable on N.C. 211 in Lumberton.

"They couldn't do any O-type dialing, such as credit card, third number or collect calls," said Frice. "We've received calls from quite a few subscribers because of their frustration trying to make calls out."

Up to 1,000 customers may have missed out on calls Monday, he said. That's the average number of attempts made locally each day to reach operator services.

The fiber optics cable, which contained 1,104 operator circuits, was extensively damaged by utility work done by the town of Lumberton, he said, creating a major outage.

It affected Southern Bell customers in Wilmington, Long Beach and Southport as well as all ATMC subscribers.

'No' Program Extends To County High Schools

The "Just Say No" program, begun in Brunswick County middle schools in October, will extend to the three county high schools this month, according to Kale Brooks, program coordinator

This project was made possible for the county school system through a state grant obtained by Laraine Williams, special education director for Brunswick County Schools.

The curriculum focuses on learn-

ing to "say no" to alcohol and drug use and premature sexual involve ment. Brooks said that when students ask about contraception physiological sexual functions, they are directed to school nurses of selors or the Brunswick County Health Department.

'Our curriculum is based on the

concept that individuals with drug use or premature sexual involvement problems have symptoms in com-mon," Brooks said. "These include poor self-esteem, a lack of assertiveness, inability to cope positively, poor decision-making skills, and lack of association with positive groups of friends."

She said her program strives to increase self-esteem, improve decision-making, and increase asser-tiveness techniques, so that students

are better prepared to say, "No."

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Shuttle Crash Affects Oysters

Because Florida waters were clos-ed for salvage of the space shuttle Challenger last January, planting of cultch for syster beds in Brunswick nty was significantly lower in

1986 than in other coastal counties.

Jerry Parker, shellfish biologist
with the N.C. Marine Fisheries Division, said most calico scarlop shells used for implantation of oyster larvae in this county are procured from waters in Florida and Virginia

"This year (1986) the waters were closed immediately after the Challenger exploded so they could search for wreckage," he said, "so we couldn't get as many shells last summer."

In Brunswick County 13,970 bushels of shells were planted last year, while 72,000 bushels were planted in Carteret County, and 94,500 in Hyde County. Other totals were 15,525 in Onslow, 43,000 in Dare, and 22,500 in Pamilico.

The scallop or oyster shells are planted in May in waters chosen with these criteria in mind: they have mud flats that won't silt over, the sand is not shifting, and there are adult oysters present.

Parker said 18 months to two years Parker said 18 months to two years elapse between attachment of the larvae and harvesting of adult oysters. "Then we can plant again and we can also open the waters to clamming," he added. "This procedure makes the waters better."

cedure makes the waters better."
This technique is somewhat more cost effective than the relay, or rehabilitation of oysters by moving them from polluted to clean waters, Parker said. Shells are purchased for about 35 cents per bushel, and usually the harvest amounts to a bushel of oysters per hushel of shells. oysters per bushel of shells

"Sometimes as many as 20 spats (larvae) will attach to one shell," he aid

For rehabilitation, workers are paid \$1 per bushel to move oyslers to clean waters. "Both methods work good, though," he added.

During 1986, 9,180 bushels of oysters were moved in Lockwood Folly River, 2,140 in Shallotte River, and 1,450 in the eastern channel, according to a recent Marine Fisheries report.
